- (3) explain to the House why the Australian people should have any confidence in a Government that expects them to believe that Government debt will be repaid by 2022 without any evidence or foundation for such a claim; and
- (4) inform the House whether he has any confidence in the Treasurer, who has lost control of the nation's finances and will not come clean with the Australian people as to the true state of the Government's parlous financial state.

#### 19 PRIVILEGE—STATEMENT BY SPEAKER

The Speaker referred to the matter of privilege raised by Mr Pyne on 27 May 2009 concerning references made by Ministers to the role that Members had had in making representations about, and being involved in, infrastructure projects in their electorates. The Member for Sturt had claimed that Members would be intimidated from becoming involved in such activities as a result of the references in the House, thus interfering with the performance of their duties as Members. He had also referred to particular electorates being disadvantaged by the Government's administration of the decision making about infrastructure projects.

In relation to the alleged interference with Members, the Speaker stated that a relatively similar matter had been raised in 2006 and on that occasion, a *prima facie* case of a breach of privilege had not been found. The Speaker stated that the matters referred to by the Member for Sturt in the present instance may be seen to be part of a similarly robust political debate and, on the information presented, as not constituting improper interference with Members continuing to perform their duties in representing their constituents. In relation to the possible differential treatment of Members with respect to infrastructure projects, the Speaker referred to his comments about the matter of privilege raised by the Member for Sturt earlier in 2009. The Speaker had noted that government programs were matters for the government to administer, and unless there was evidence that such administration amounted to an improper interference with Members performing their duties as Members within their electorates, it was not easy to see that a matter of privilege arose. The Speaker said that he did not see evidence of such interference in the matters raised yesterday by the Member for Sturt.

The Speaker concluded that, having regard to these considerations and the long established policy of restraint in matters of privilege and contempt, he did not consider that a *prima facie* case had been made as would warrant precedence being given to a motion in respect of this matter.
