- 6. Suspension of Standing Orders.—Sir John Forrest moved, by leave, That the Standing Orders be suspended to enable all steps to be taken to read the Appropriation (Works and Buildings) Bill 1913-14 a first time without delay. Question—put and passed.
- 7. Supply Resolution [Estimates-Additions, New Works, Buildings, etc., 1913-14].—The Resolution reported from the Committee of Supply was read, and is as follows:-

Additions, New Works, Buildings, etc., 1913-14.

Resolved—That there be granted to His Majesty to the service of the year 1913-14, for the purposes of Additions, New Works, Buildings, &c., a sum not exceeding £3,266,569.

And, on the motion of Sir John Forrest, the said Resolution was adopted by the House.

8. WAYS AND MEANS RESOLUTION .- The House, according to Order, resolved itself into the Committee of Ways and Means.

(In the Committee.)

Additions, New Works, Buildings, etc., 1913-1914.

Resolved, on the motion of Sir John Forrest—That towards making good the Supply granted to His Majesty for Additions, New Works, Buildings, &c., for the year 1913-14, a sum not exceeding Three million two hundred and sixty-six thousand five hundred and sixtynine pounds be granted out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

Resolution to be reported, and leave asked to sit again. The House resumed; Mr. Fowler reported accordingly.

Resolved—That the House will, at its next sitting, again resolve itself into the said Committee. The Resolution reported from the Committee was read, and, on the motion of Sir John Forrest, was adopted by the House.

Ordered-That Sir John Forrest and Mr. W. H. Irvine do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing Resolution.

- 9. APPROPRIATION (WORKS AND BUILDINGS) BILL 1913-14.—Sir John Forrest then brought up a Bill intituled "A Bill for an Act to grant and apply a sum out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund for the service of the year ending the thirtieth day of June One thousand nine hundred and fourteen for the purposes of Additions, New Works, Buildings, &c." and moved, That it be now read a first time. Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.
 - Ordered—That the second reading be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.
- 10. Paper.—Mr. Joseph Cook presented, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General— Railways—Report (together with Appendices) of the Uniform Gauge Conference held at Melbourne, December, 1912, and April, 1913.

Ordered to lie on the Table, and to be printed.

- 11. Adjournment.—Mr. Joseph Cook moved, That the House do now adjourn. Question—put and passed.
- And then the House, at five minutes to two o'clock in the morning, adjourned until this day at three o'clock p.m.
