- 2. Message from the Governor-General.-Inscribed Stock Bill (1913).-The following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General was presented, and the same was read by Mr. Speaker:

DENMAN,

Governor-General.

Message No. 23.

In accordance with the requirements of section fifty-six of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to amend the Commonwealth Inscribed Stock Act 1911-1912.

Ordered—That the consideration of the foregoing Message in Committee of the whole House be made an Order of the Day for to-morrow.
