INVALID AND OLD-AGE PENSIONS BILL (1913).—Appropriation recommended by Governor-General, 88. Governor-General's Message considered in Committee and appropriation agreed to, 90. Bill brought in and read a first time, 95. Second reading, 218. (*Lapsed at prorogation.*)

PINE CREEK TO KATHERINE RIVER RAILWAY BILL.—Leave given to bring in Bill; brought in and read a first time, 178. Appropriation recommended by Governor-General, 193. Governor-General's Message considered in Committee and appropriation agreed to, 199. Second reading; Committee; reported without amendment; report adopted and (Standing Orders having been suspended) Bill read a third time, 199. Returned by Senate with amendments, 221. Amendments considered in Committee; two agreed to, three disagreed to (one on division); Reasons for disagreeing adopted, 223. Senate does not insist upon one amendment, but insists upon others with amendments; amendments considered in Committee; one agreed to and one disagreed to, 232-3. Senate no longer insists on amendment disagreed to by House, 235. Assented to, 237. *Act No. 21 of 1913.*

POST AND TELEGRAPH BILL (1913).—Leave given to bring in Bill; brought in and read a first time, 173. Second reading, 199, 202. Committee, reported with an amendment and (Standing Orders having been suspended) Bill passed through remaining stages, 202. Agreed to by Senate without amendment, 210. Assented to, 237. *Act No. 23 of 1913.*

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PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE BILL.—Leave given to bring in Bill; brought in and read a first time, 204. Appropriation recommended by Governor-General; Governor-General's Message considered in Committee and appropriation agreed to, 206. Second reading, 206, 217. Committee 217-18. Reported with amendments, and (Standing Orders having been suspended) Bill passed through remaining stages, 218. Returned by Senate with amendments; amendments considered in Committee; one agreed to, one disagreed to, and a consequential amendment made in Clause 3 of the Bill, 233. Senate does not insist on amendment disagreed to by House and agrees to consequential amendment made by House, 235. Assented to, 237. *Act No. 20 of 1913.*

SUGAR BOUNTY BILL (1913).—Appropriation recommended by Governor-General, 73. Governor-General's Message considered in Committee and appropriation agreed to, 74. Bill brought in and read a first time, 74. Second reading; Committee; reported without amendment; Report adopted, 82. Bill read a third time, 90. Agreed to by Senate without amendment, 112. Assented to, 129. *Act No. 7 of 1913.*

SUPPLEMENTARY APPROPRIATION BILL 1911-12.—Brought in on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means, and (Standing Orders having been suspended, p. 226) Bill passed through all stages, 227. Agreed to by Senate without requests, 234. Assented to, 237. *Act No. 12 of 1913.*

SUPPLEMENTARY APPROPRIATION (WORKS AND BUILDINGS) BILL 1911-12.—Brought in on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means, and (Standing Orders having been suspended, p. 226) Bill passed through all stages, 227-8. Agreed to by Senate without amendment, 232. Assented to, 237. *Act No. 10 of 1913.*

SUPPLEMENTARY APPROPRIATION BILL 1912-13.—Brought in on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means, and (Standing Orders having been suspended, p. 226) Bill passed through all stages, 228. Agreed to by Senate without requests, 234. Assented to, 237. *Act No. 13 of 1913.*

SUPPLEMENTARY APPROPRIATION (WORKS AND BUILDINGS) BILL 1912-13.—Brought in on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means, and (Standing Orders having been suspended, p. 226) Bill passed through all stages, 228. Agreed to by Senate without amendment, 232. Assented to, 237. *Act No. 11 of 1913.*

SUPPLY BILL (No. 1) 1913-14.—Appropriation recommended by Governor-General, 5. Brought in on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means, and (Standing Orders having been suspended, p. 6) Bill passed through all stages, 7. Agreed to by Senate without requests, 12. Assented to, 13. *Act No. 1 of 1913.*

SUPPLY BILL (No. 2) 1913-14.—Appropriation recommended by Governor-General, 31. Brought in on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means, and (Standing Orders having been suspended, p. 31) Bill passed through all stages, 32. Agreed to by Senate without requests, 35. Assented to, 37. *Act No. 2 of 1913.*
