APPROPRIATION (WORKS AND BUILDINGS) BILL 1913-14.—Brought in on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and read a first time, 105. Second reading, 107-8. Committee; reported without amendment, and Report adopted, 108. Bill read a third time, 112. Agreed to by Senate without amendment, 137. Assented to, 149. Act No. 8 of 1913.

AUDIT BILL (1913).—Leave given to bring in Bill; brought in and read a first time, 44. Appropriation recommended by Governor-General, 45. Second reading, 45, 53. Governor-General's Message considered in Committee, and appropriation agreed to, 53. Committee, 53, 55, 56. Reported with an amendment, and, by leave, Report adopted, 56. Bill read a third time, 57. Returned by Senate with an amendment, 147. Amendment considered and disagreed to; reasons for disagreeing adopted, 170. Senate insists upon its amendment; Bill laid aside, 205.

Australian Notes Bill (1913).—Leave given to bring in Bill; brought in and read a first time, 173. Second reading, 194. Agreed to (on division), 198. Committee, reported without amendment, Report adopted and (Standing Orders having been suspended) Bill read a third time, 198. (Not returned from Senate.)

Navigation Bill (which was reserved last Session)
