A Bill initialed "An Act to extend the powers of the Governor-General during the continuance of the present hostilities to make regulations under the 'Patents Act 1903-1909,' the 'Trade Marks Act 1905-1912,' and the 'Designs Act 1906-1912,'" as finally passed by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth, having been presented to the Governor-General for the Royal Assent, His Excellency has, in the name and on behalf of His Majesty, assented to the said Act.

Clause 1 agreed to. Clause 2 debated—

Mr. Finlayson moved the following amendment :---

Line 13, after the word "goods" insert the words :--- "and suspend or remit Customs duty on raw materials required to maintain industries and prevent unemployment and on goods required as necessities of life."

Debate ensued.

Question--put and negatived.

On the motion of Mr. Groom the following amendment was made, after debate :---

At end of clause add, "and (c) by inserting the words 'and subsection (1A.)' after the words 'paragraph (b)."

Clause, as amended, agreed to.

Title agreed to.

Bill to be reported with an amendment.

The House resumed ; Mr. Chanter reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr. Tudor, by leave, the House adopted the Report, and the Bill was read a third time.

13. PURCHASE TELEPHONE LINES ACQUISITION BILL (1914).—The Order of the Day having been read for the second reading—Mr. Spence moved, That the Bill be now read a second time. Debate ensued.

Question-put and passed.-Bill read a second time.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

(In the Committee.)

Clause 1 debated and agreed to. Clause 2 read— Progress to be reported, and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed ; Mr. Chanter reported accordingly. Resolved—That the House will, to-morrow, again resolve itself into the said Committee.
