- 1. The House met, at three o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker took the Chair, and read Prayers.

- 4. States Loan Bill (1917).—The Order of the Day having been read for the consideration in Committee of the whole House of His Excellency the Governor-General's Message No. 16— Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

Resolved, on the motion of Sir John Forrest, after debatc—That it is expedient that an appropriation of revenue and moneys be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to authorize the raising of Moneys to be loaned to, and the advancing of Moneys to, certain States.

Resolution to be reported.

The House resumed; Mr. Chanter reported accordingly.

Sir John Forrest moved, pursuant to contingent notice, That the Standing Orders be suspended, to enable the remaining stages to be passed without delay.

Question—put and passed.

The said Resolution was read, and, on the motion of Sir John Forrest, was adopted by the House. Ordered—That Sir John Forrest and Mr. Hughes do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing Resolution.

Sir John Forrest then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time. Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Sir John Forrest moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Question-put and passed.-Bill read a second time.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.
