4. Message from the Governor-General.—Assent to Supply Bill (No. 2) 1918-19.—The following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General was received, and the same was read by Mr. Speaker:—

A Bill intituled "An Act to grant and apply a sum out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund for the service of the year ending the thirtieth day of June One thousand nine hundred and nineteen," as finally passed by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth, having been presented to the Governor-General for the Royal Assent, His Excellency has, in the name and on behalf of His Majesty, assented to the said Act.

Ordered—That Mr. Groom and Mr. Poynton do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing Resolution.

Mr. Groom then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Ordered—That the second reading be made an Order of the Day for to-morrow.

8. ADJOURNMENT.—Mr. Groom moved, That the House do now adjourn.
