Message No. 64.

In accordance with the requirements of section fifty-six of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of moneys be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to authorize the issue and application of the sum of Eight million three hundred and seventy thousand four hundred and six pounds.

 - Mr. Charlton moved, as an amendment, That the following words be added to the motion:
 - "Provided that the Commonwealth Government shall take steps to insure a continuance of the Wheat Pool, and immediately enter into negotiation with the various State Governments in order to give effect to this principle."
