- The House met, at cleven o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Message from the Senate.—Supply Bill (No. 2) 1922-23.—Mr. Speaker announced the receipt of the following Message from the Senate:—

The Senate returns to the House of Representatives the Bill for "An Act to grant and apply a sum out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund for the service of the year ending the thirtieth day of June One thousand nine hundred and twenty-three," to which it has agreed without requests.

Mr. Blundell moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Ordered-That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.
