In accordance with the requirements of section fifty-six of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Deputy of the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to provide Superannuation Benefits for Persons employed by the Commonwealth and to make provision for the families of those persons.
