- 1. The House met, at eleven o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Right Honorable W. A. Watt) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Petition.—Sir Austin Chapman presented a Petition from certain residents of Michelago and surrounding towns and districts, stating that large quantities of marble and also deposits suitable for the manufacture of carbide of calcium and cement are situated near Michelago, and praying that the Government proceed with the development of the said marble and other deposits, with a view to their being turned into a national asset. Petition received and read.
- 3. ADJOURNMENT-MOTION FOR PURPOSE OF DISCUSSION .- Mr. Charlton rose in his place, and said that he proposed to move the adjournment of the House for the purpose of discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance, namely, "The statement made by the Prime Minister in regard to the Australian cruiser *Brisbane* in Chinese waters."

 Mr. Speaker thereupon called upon those Members who approved of the proposed discussion to rise

in their places, and more than the necessary number of Members having risen accordingly-

Mr. Charlton moved, That the House do now adjourn.

Mr. Bruce (Prime Minister), addressing the House, and not having concluded his speech at the termination of the time allowed by Standing Order No. 39—
Suspension of Standing Orders.—Mr. Earle Page (Treasurer) moved, That the Standing

Orders be suspended to enable the honorable Member to continue his speech.

Question-put and passed, with the concurrence of an absolute majority of the Members of the House.

Mr. Bruce continued and concluded his speech.

Debate continued.
