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Bills

67.01 Two bills introduced and pass all stages

The Excise Tariff Validation Bill 2009, and a companion bill, the Customs Tariff Validation Bill 2009, were introduced pursuant to notice on 12 May and in each case debate on the second reading was adjourned to a later hour. Debate resumed immediately after the bills' introduction, both bills being debated cognately. Each bill was then read a second time, and a third time by leave.

67.02 Presentation of Budget and additional appropriation bills, including explanatory memoranda

On 12 May, the Treasurer presented Appropriation Bill (No. 1) 2009-2010, moved the second reading and delivered the budget speech. After the Treasurer had presented associated documents and statements, the Minister for Finance and Deregulation presented Appropriation Bill (No. 2) 2009-2010 and Appropriation (Parliamentary Departments) Bill (No. 1) 2009-2010. An explanatory memorandum was presented with the first two bills.

The Speaker announced receipt of a message from the Governor-General recommending appropriation before each bill was presented.

Note: Explanatory memoranda are not required for budget bills under the standing orders.

67.04 Suspension of standing order 31 for Budget reply speech

The Leader of the House, pursuant to notice, moved that standing order 31 (automatic adjournment of the House) be suspended for the sitting on Thursday, 14 May 2009, and that the House automatically adjourn following the budget reply speech by the Leader of the Opposition. The motion was agreed to on the voices.

67.05 Different treatment of condolence motions

Two separate condolence motions regarding the deaths of Corporal Mathew Ricky Andrew Hopkins and Sergeant Brett Till were considered in the Main Committee. One was the resumption of debate on a motion of condolence moved by the Prime Minister.

The other was treated as the resumption of debate on a motion of the Leader of the House, that the House take note of the document (being a copy of the Prime Minister's condolence motion). This was because the condolence motion had been put and passed in the House so, in order for it to be referred to the Main Committee for further debate, a motion to take note of the motion of condolence presented by the Prime Minister was required.

In both cases Members stood in silence as a mark of respect and the motions were returned to the House where they were passed, with all Members again rising in silence.

67.06 Motion to suspend standing orders to condemn a backbencher

Following prayers, the Manager of Opposition Business sought leave to move a motion condemning a backbencher. Leave was not granted and the Manager of Opposition Business then moved to suspend standing and sessional orders to allow a motion to be moved condemning a backbench Government Member in

relation to comments he had made the previous day, and inviting the Member to attend the House immediately and apologise.

After the motion had been outlined to the House, a Minister moved that the Member be no longer heard, which was carried on division. As an Opposition Member seconded and began to speak to the motion, he was also closured on division. The motion for the suspension of standing orders was then negatived on a further division.

Later in the sitting, the Member referred to in the motion sought the call on indulgence and made a brief statement regarding the matter, stating that he regretted any offence caused by his comments.

67.07 Speaker asked about broadcasting lights and policy

During Question Time, a Shadow Minister asked the Speaker why the broadcasting indication lights had been turned off. The Speaker responded that he would endeavour to find out why the lights were flashing on and off, but noted that Senate Question Time was being broadcast that day, and that points of order would not be included in the House re-broadcast.

Following Question Time, the Speaker was asked why the ABC does not provide a complete replay of the Chamber not directly broadcast. The Speaker noted that the Joint Committee on the Broadcasting of Parliamentary Proceedings was responsible for decisions regarding the broadcasting of proceedings, and added that the broadcasting lights should not have been switched on and off earlier during Question Time.
