

### **Bills**

84.01 House declines to consider Senate bill requiring an appropriation

On 21 February, the Speaker reported a message from the Senate transmitting a bill for concurrence of the House. The Speaker stated that the bill transmitted by the Senate had given rise to some important issues in terms of the role and responsibilities of the House of Representatives. Specifically, the bill provided for an increase in expenditure under a standing appropriation. Section 53 of the Constitution provides that proposed laws appropriating revenue or moneys can not originate in the Senate. Section 56 of the Constitution requires a Governor-General's message recommending the purpose of an appropriation before passage of a law etc. for the appropriation of revenue or moneys. The Speaker then presented two documents, one a note from the Clerk's Office on the standing orders and practice of the House, and the second a letter from the Attorney-General in relation to the matter.

The Leader of the House then moved 'That the House affirm the constitutional position as stated by the Speaker and decline to consider the Social Security (Income Support for Regional Students) Bill 2010'. Debate on the motion ensued. Mr Bandt moved an amendment to the motion which was seconded by Mr Oakeshott. The amendment was negatived and the motion was agreed to. The bill therefore was not considered by the House.

### 84.02 Requested amendments by Senate made

By message, the Senate requested amendments to the Telecommunications Interception and Intelligence Services Legislation Amendment Bill 2010, *inter alia* to expand the membership of the Parliamentary Joint Committee on Intelligence and Security from nine to eleven members, five of whom must be Senators and six of whom must be members of the House of Representatives.

The amendments requested by the Senate were considered immediately and made.

**84.03** Second reading amendment relating to youth allowance moved on Appropriation bill

During debate on the second reading of Appropriation Bill (No. 3) 2010-11 in the Main Committee, the Manager of Opposition Business moved an amendment proposing to omit certain words and calling on 'the Government to bring forward its timetable for resolving the inequity it has created in independent youth allowance payments for inner regional students...'. The amendment was seconded, and the time for the debate having expired, the debate was adjourned and the resumption of debate was made an order of the day for the next sitting. On Wednesday 2 March, after further debate, the bill was returned to the House from the Main Committee with an unresolved question (on the second reading amendment), and the following day, was reported to the House and considered. The House divided on the question that the words proposed to be omitted stand part of the question, and the 'ayes' being in the majority, the second reading amendment was negatived. The bill was then agreed to on the voices.

*Note*: Pursuant to standing order 145(b), an amendment to the motion that an appropriation or supply bill be read a second time may relate to public affairs beyond the scope of the bill.

### **Business**

84.04 Condolence motion automatically returned to the Main Committee

On the motion, by leave, of the Leader of the House, the condolence motion on the summer's natural disasters (*see* entries *83.09* and *83.14*) was automatically referred to the Main Committee – for a second time – when the time for its debate in the House was interrupted shortly before question time.

### 84.06 Suspension of standing orders not carried by an absolute majority

Following question time, the shadow Treasurer moved a suspension of standing and sessional orders to enable him to move a motion requiring the House to note the release of 'secret Treasury documents'. During debate on the suspension motion, the Manager of Opposition Business moved that the Leader of the House be 'no further heard'. The motion was negatived on division. The time allotted for the debate on the original suspension motion having expired, the question was put. The result of the division was 71 'ayes' and 71 'noes', and in the absence of an absolute majority, the motion was not carried.

*Note:* Standing order 47(c)(ii) provides that a motion for suspension of standing orders moved without notice can only be carried by an absolute majority of Members (at least 76 out of 150).

### 84.07 Condolence motions put and passed

Following further consideration in the Main Committee, certified copies of two condolence motions – one on the summer's natural disasters and the other on the death of Sapper Jamie Ronald Larcombe – were presented in the House. On the question that each motion be agreed to, Members rose in their places in agreement.

# 84.08 Suspension motion moved during question time—questions continue and MPI not lost

During question time on 24 February, the Leader of the Opposition moved a motion to suspend so much of standing and sessional orders as would prevent the moving of a motion for the House to censure the Prime Minister for her announcement of a carbon tax. The motion was debated and negatived on division.

*Note:* The total time allowed on motions to suspend standing and sessional orders may not exceed 25 minutes. The motion having been moved at 2.30 pm and its debate concluding by 3.04 pm, question time continued following the division, and the matter of public importance discussion took place without a motion to call on the business of the day. When similar motions were moved the following week at 2.50 pm, questions without notice did not resume although matters of public importance were discussed (*see* entry *84.09*).

**84.09** Four motions to suspend standing orders to allow explanations by the Prime Minister

Each day in the week beginning 28 February, the Leader of the Opposition moved, during question time, a suspension of so much of standing and sessional orders as would prevent him from moving motions requiring an action by the Prime Minister (and on some occasions, the Treasurer).

Following debate on each of these motions, the House divided and the motions were negatived. Also on each occasion, the Prime Minister asked that further questions be placed on the *Notice Paper*. (When a similar motion to suspend standing orders had been moved the previous Thursday, questions had continued at the conclusion of debate – see entry *84.08*).

In the course of the debate on Wednesday 2 March, the Leader of the House indicated the Government's willingness to suspend standing orders to facilitate the debate. Debate on the motion ensued and the question on the motion was then negatived on division. On a point of order, the Chief Government Whip noted that the debate had not been relevant to the suspension motion.

On the Thursday, the Speaker invited the Leader of the Opposition (and other speakers) to debate the question of why the suspension of standing orders should occur.

*Note*: Speakers have consistently ruled that Members may not use debate on a motion to suspend standing orders as a means of putting before the House, or canvassing, matters outside the question as to whether or not standing orders should be suspended (pursuant to standing order 76). The rule, however, is not strictly enforced.

# **84.10** Opposition amendments negatived – non-aligned Member's amendments agreed to

During consideration in detail of the National Broadband Network Companies Bill 2010, an Opposition Member moved, by leave, amendments in the following order and groupings: (1)-(4) and (8)-(15), (5), (6), (7), (17), (16) (18) and (19). Each group of amendments was debated and negatived on the voices except amendment (17) which was negatived on division after debate.

In considering the cognate Telecommunications Legislation Amendment (National Broadband Network Measures—Access Arrangements) Bill 2010, a non-aligned Member moved two amendments which were put and passed. The Opposition Member moved further amendments, which were also negatived on the voices.

### 84.11 Committee reports presented during government business

In government business time, the Chair of the Standing Committee on Economics presented two reports. The first was the *Advisory report on the Tax Laws Amendment* (*Temporary Flood Reconstruction Levy*) *Bill 2010 and the Income Tax Rates Amendment*(*Temporary Flood Reconstruction Levy*) *Bill 2011*, and the second was the *Interim report: Review of Wild Rivers* (*Environmental Management*) *Bill 2010*. The Chair and the Deputy Chair made statements, by leave, in connection with the first report. The Chair then moved that the House take note of the first report and the matter was referred to the Main Committee.

# 84.15 Resolution to appoint a joint committee on the National Broadband Network

On the motion of the Leader of the House, the House resolved to appoint a Joint Committee on the National Broadband Network. As well as terms of reference and operating parameters, the resolution specified the membership of the committee and that it was to be chaired by a non-aligned Member.

A message was sent to the Senate requesting concurrence and action to be taken accordingly. In considering the resolution, the Government in the Senate made various amendments to the resolution (although these had not yet been communicated to the House at the conclusion of these sittings).

# **84.16** Resolution to appoint a joint select committee on the Christmas Island tragedy

On the motion of the Leader of the House, the House resolved to appoint a Joint Select Committee on the Christmas Island Tragedy of 15 December 2010. As well as terms of reference and operating parameters, the resolution specified the membership of the committee and a date for presentation of its final report (30 June 2011). The Senate later advised the House of its concurrence.

#### 84.17 Few Members vote 'no' in divisions

During consideration in detail of the National Radioactive Waste Management Bill 2011 on 21 February, a non-aligned Member moved an amendment. While a division was required, it was deferred until 8 pm in accordance with standing order 133, at which time the question was put on the amendments. When the division was called, five Members voted 'no'.

The following day, on a division for the bill's second reading, six Members (five non-aligned and one Opposition) voted 'no'. In this division, the Chair assigned two non-aligned Members tellers for the 'noes'.

*Note*: Where four or fewer Members are on one side of the House after the doors are locked for a division, the Chair may declare the decision of the House immediately, without completing the count. The names of those in disagreement are recorded in the *Votes and Proceedings*.

## **Matters of Public Importance**

84.19 Two matters of public importance proposed for discussion

Having received two proposals for a discussion of a matter of public importance by midday on 22 February, the Speaker chose the matter proposed by a government Member in preference to that proposed by a shadow minister. Standing order 46 requires the Speaker to exercise his or her opinion on urgency and importance when more than one matter is proposed. During the debate, leave was granted for an Opposition Member to table a document.

*Note*: While a matter of public importance debate is generally considered an opportunity for the Opposition to raise an issue, government sponsored discussions do take place from time to time.

84.20 Member not recognised to raise a point of order and subsequently 'sin-binned' for defying the Chair

During a Minister's response to a question without notice, an Opposition Member attempted to raise a point of order. The Speaker asked the Minister and the Member to resume their seats. The Manager of Opposition Business, on a point of order, queried the Speaker's refusal to give the Opposition Member the call. The Speaker decided to give the Member the call, but with a warning that only a valid

point of order would be allowed. When the Member sought leave to table a document, the Speaker directed the Member to leave the Chamber for one hour.

*Note*: Pursuant to standing order 104(b), a point of order regarding relevance may only be taken once in respect of an answer.

#### Order of business

84.26 House meets early — government business given priority — adjournment debate in House cancelled — adjournment of Main Committee extended

On Monday 21 February, the Leader of the House moved, by leave, that the time and order of business for the following sitting day be changed. The motion required that the House meet at 12 noon, that priority be given to government business between 12 noon and 2 pm, and between 9.30 pm and 10.30 pm and that any divisions called for in the House – other than those on a motion moved by a Minister – be deferred until after the conclusion of the matter of public importance.

As part of this motion, the Leader of the House also stated that the question on the adjournment would be put without debate in the House on the Tuesday. The adjournment debate in the Main Committee would be extended from half an hour to an hour. The question was agreed to on the voices.

*Note*: The House usually meets at 2 pm, and the Main Committee meets only 'if required' on Tuesdays.

### 84.27 Meeting of the Main Committee postponed due to a division

During consideration of two cognate bills relating to a flood levy intended for flood reconstruction, the Leader of the House, pursuant to notice, moved that standing order 31 (automatic adjournment of the House) and standing order 33 (limit on business after 10 pm) be suspended for that sitting day (Wednesday). The motion was moved in anticipation of the House sitting later than usual to consider the bills, and was agreed to on the voices.

# 84.31 Notice to suspend standing and sessional orders during question time

The Leader of the House gave notice of a motion that would suspend standing and sessional orders for the remainder of the period of sittings to prevent any motions being moved during question time by any Member other than a Minister.

*Note*: Having been put on notice, this motion – if moved – would not require an absolute majority of the House to be carried. Similar motions have been put on notice in other parliaments, although usually not limited to the period of question time.

*Note*: It is usual practice for Members to advise the Speaker orally of the questions in writing they have yet to receive an answer to, under standing order 105(b).

On 21 February, in accordance with the determinations of the Selection Committee, a private Member's notice of motion on tourism funding was called on. The motion was moved and seconded (the seconder reserving his right to speak). Debate continued until the time allotted by the Selection Committee had expired and the resumption of the debate was made an order of the day for a later hour that day. At 12.01 pm, the Leader of the House moved, by leave, that the motion be referred to the Main Committee.

At a later hour, debate resumed in the Main Committee until the time allotted expired.

*Note*: In its report (No. 11), the Selection Committee had allocated time for this motion in both the House and the Main Committee.

### 84.35 Private Member's bill co-sponsored

In his speech on presentation of the Patent Amendment (Human Gene and Biological Materials) Bill 2010, an Opposition Member noted that, in the House,

the bill was co-sponsored by the coalition and a non-aligned Member. A similar bill introduced into the Senate was co-sponsored by the coalition, an Independent Senator, and the Greens.

*Note:* Standing order 41(c) makes provision for a bill to be presented by a 'Member in whose name the notice stands'. A similar situation occurred in 2003 in relation to the Australian Flags (Desecration of the Flag) Bill 2003. Notice was given by one of the joint presenters, the bill was introduced by that Member and seconded by the other. Senate standing order 76(4) provides for joint presentation of notices.

Speaker invited members of the committee appointed to bring up the Address, and other Members, to accompany him to Government House for the presentation and noted that sitting would be suspended at 5 pm on that day.

On 2 March 2011, the House adjourned at 4.57 pm and the Members for Robertson and Bass, together with other Members, accompanied the Speaker to Government House.

The following day, the Speaker reported to the House the Governor-General's response.
