This submission is in response to the JSCEM's invitation for public comment as part of its Inquiry into the Conduct of the 2001 Federal Election.

I moved to Denmark in July 2001 for work related reasons. I will be away from Australia for an indefinite period but I have no intention of taking up another citizenship.

When I wished to notify the Electoral Commission of my intention to move I rang for some advice. The person I spoke to seemed very vague about what should be done and ended up telling me to submit a "change of address" with my overseas address.

I later discovered that my address wasn't changed and I still appeared on the electoral roll, registered at my old address. I rang the Electoral Office again and was told that I needed an address within Australia.

This seems very odd to me as I don't reside there. I had to give a relative's address so that I could keep my voting rights.

I voted via the Danish Embassy in the last Federal election but I really have no idea if my vote was valid because I have no confirmation that my Electoral address is, in fact, my relative's address.

I would like better access to information about my electoral status/details and I would like information sent directly to me at my present residential address, instead of having to rely on my relative's good will to pass any information on.
