SUPPLEMENTARY SUBMISSION TO THE JOINT STANDING COMMITTEE ON ELECTORAL MATTERS' INQUIRY INTO THE 2001 FEDERAL ELECTION

FOURTH SUBMISSION IN RESPONSE TO QUESTIONS ON NOTICE

Canberra 19 March 2003

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Fourth submission to question on notice

1. Introduction

1.1 This submission by the Australian Electoral Commission (AEC) is presented to the Joint Standing Committee on Electoral Matters (JSCEM) in response to its 'inquiry into the conduct of the 2001 federal election', as advertised in the national press on 25 May 2002.

1.2 The submission details AEC responses to questions on notice provided by the JSCEM in February 2003

1.3 At the time of publishing, the AEC was preparing responses to other questions on notice provided through February, and anticipates that further questions will be provided by the JSCEM. The AEC will respond to these questions in later submissions.

1.4 The AEC has on previous occasions commented on issues similar to those responded to here. Where this has occurred, the submission provides references to those previous comments.

2. Enrolment issues

Delivery of enrolment forms

2.1 The JSCEM requested data comparing the number of enrolments made via Australia Post with the number of enrolments made in person at AEC offices.

2.2 Enrolment forms may be delivered to the AEC by hand, by mail or by fax.

2.3 In addition to being available at AEC offices, forms, together with Business Reply Paid envelopes, are available to the public at Australia Post outlets. Forms are also available from State and Territory Electoral Offices. The AEC website provides the facility to print forms for completion and mailing or faxing to the AEC.

2.4 The AEC does not maintain statistics measuring the number of enrolment forms delivered by hand to AEC offices. The number is however known to be negligible, other than during a close of rolls when, in some Divisions, the number is much higher. The great majority of the forms are delivered to the AEC through the mail with a small number being sent by fax, particularly during the close of roll period.

2.5 Over the two financial years 2000/01 and 2001/02, of the 4,802,477 enrolment forms received and processed, 2,636,573 (Approx 55%) forms resulted from AEC Continuous Roll Update activities. The remaining 45% were provided at the electors' initiative.

Enrolment of 18 year olds

2.6 The JSCEM was interested in determining the proportion of 18 year olds who enrol within the close of roll period, compared with those who enrol at other times. Table 1 below details this information, commencing with the close of roll period for the 1993 federal election and ending with the close of roll period for the 2001 federal election.

Enrolment processing at election times

2.7 The JSCEM asked whether the AEC employs more processing staff during the close of roll period and in the period immediately before the Certified Lists are produced.

2.8 The AEC usually has a complement of 3 Full Time Equivalents (FTEs) per Divisional Office, of which 1.5 - 2 FTE are primarily engaged in enrolment processing. Temporary employees are engaged in Divisional Offices during the election period to assist with a variety of election processing tasks. For the 2001 Federal election temporary employees worked for 47,227 hours (across 150 Divisions) on processing of enrolment forms. The vast majority of this work occurred during the close of roll period and in the period immediately before the Certified Lists were produced.

2.9 It should also be noted that in those Divisional Offices where the APS2 position is job-shared by two part time permanent employees, both part time APS2s usually reverts to full time hours during an election period (in other words the FTE is 4 during an election for these Divisions). The primary work of the APS2, at least during the close of roll period, is processing of enrolment forms.

Close of roll enrolment statistics

2.10 The JSCEM asked the AEC to provide figures for close of roll enrolments for: each day in the seven day close of roll period; and by Division for the 1998 and 2001 federal elections.

2.11 **Attachment A** provides Enrolment Activity Reports for new enrolments and enrolment changes from the issue of writ to the close of rolls for the 1998 and 2001 federal elections. The figures are provided by State/Territory for each day of the close of roll period.

2.12 **Attachment B** provides details of cards processed by each Division for each of those days. The card processing statistics for 1998 do not show reinstatements to the Roll. Program changes made since that time enable these figures to be provided as a separate figure for 2001.

2.13 It should be noted that the figures are provided in two formats: Enrolment Activity Reports by State and Territory, and card processing statistics by Division, for each day of the Roll Close.

2.14 Enrolment Activity Reports are generated on the basis of entitlement. An element of the Enrolment Activity Reports is the number of cards processed on the day the report is generated, but enrolment activity can also include

activity that is not related to card processing, such as enrolled 17 year olds turning 18 and becoming entitled to vote.

2.15 Card activity relates to enrolment forms processed – these figures do not include forms received in the Divisional Office but not processed on that day due to some defect.

2.16 The key difference between the Enrolment Activity Reports and the card processing statistics is the different treatment of 17 year old enrolments. The Enrolment Activity Report does not count 17 year olds as new enrolments until they become eligible, that is, when they turn 18. Card processing statistics include 17 year olds on the date that the enrolment form is processed.

2.17 The JSCEM asked if the AEC could provide figures for all enrolments made between the day of the Close of Rolls for the 1998 federal election and the announcement of the 2001 federal election. These figures are contained at **Attachment C**.

Verification of enrolments during the close of rolls

2.18 The JSCEM asked whether the AEC could provide anecdotal evidence concerning the numbers of enrolments processed in the close of roll period that generally require further verification checks to be made after the close of rolls.

2.19 Electors are not added to the roll during a roll close until verification of eligibility is completed. Where such verification is completed after the roll close, the elector is added to the Notebook Roll and advised to cast a declaration vote.

2.20 An exception to the above exists where further verification of the exact location of an address is required. This occurs primarily in rural Divisions. Provided the address is clearly within the Division, the elector is added to the roll and follow up undertaken subsequently to establish the exact location of the residence. The numbers of these are quite small, that is, the numbers are in the single digits for most Divisions. There have been no reports of addresses subsequently found to be invalid.

2.21 The procedures for verifying citizenship for all enrolment transactions were implemented in September 2002. Therefore, the validation of citizenship did not have a major impact during the close of rolls period for the 2001 federal election as the checking process was not as comprehensive at that time.

2.22 Divisional staff have commented that citizenship and address register verification are increasingly rigorous and time consuming and this will impact on future roll closes.

2.23 The JSCEM asked the AEC to outline the constraints it encounters in ensuring the Certified List is as accurate, complete and valid as possible at the close of rolls. In responding to this, the AEC assumes that the question relates to the accuracy of the roll data contained in the Certified List rather than any technical matters relating to the printing of the lists. 2.24 The constraints experienced by the AEC in ensuring an accurate, complete and valid roll are the volume of forms received, the tight time frame for processing forms, competing operational requirements in election preparation and the availability of trained and experienced temporary staff to assist with processing.

2.25 While the AEC does not wish to speculate to any great degree on whether resolution of these issues could be obtained by either longer processing time or earlier roll close, the AEC makes the following comments.

2.26 As stated, under the current arrangements, electors are not enrolled during the roll close unless appropriate checks have been completed, except where eligibility is not in question. Where the checks are not completed before roll close, but subsequent checking verifies eligibility before polling day, the electors are added to the Notebook Roll and advised to make a provisional vote. Therefore, providing additional time for checking would not have any significant effect on roll accuracy or validity.

2.27 The JSCEM has on previous occasions recommended the early close of the roll as a mechanism for improving the accuracy of the roll.¹ These recommendations have been given effect most recently by the *Electoral and Referendum (Roll Integrity and Other Measures) Bill 2002*, which at the time of publishing was still before the parliament. The AEC has consistently advised against an early close of the roll, most recently in submission 26 to the Inquiry into the integrity of the electoral roll, where the AEC pointed out:

Expert opinion within the AEC is that the early close of rolls will not improve the accuracy of the rolls for an election... In fact, the expectation is that the rolls for the election will be *less accurate*, because less time will be available for existing electors to correct their enrolments and for new enrolments to be received. This expected outcome is in direct conflict with the stated policy intention of the Government to improve the accuracy of the rolls. Further, it will undoubtedly have a negative impact on the franchise, an outcome which the AEC cannot support.

If the accuracy of the rolls decreases as the result of the early close of rolls, then a rise in the level of declaration voting could be expected, with consequential delays in the provision of election results.

Of particular concern is the possible impact of the early close of rolls on young people who wish to take up their franchise for the first time but are usually only motivated to do so by the announcement of an election.

The early close of rolls for federal elections would place the federal electoral system out of line with some State and Territory close of rolls legislation, possibly leading to public confusion and complaint.²

3. AEC administration and funding

Appointment of AEOs

3.1 The JSCEM requested information on the process of appointment of Australian Electoral Officers (AEOs) prior to the establishment of the AEC in February 1984. This question stems from the AEC's recommendation 5 in submission 147 to the inquiry, which stated:

That the *Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918* be amended to enable the appointment of Australian Electoral Officers by the Electoral Commission.³

3.2 Although there is no readily available information, it would appear that prior to 1973, the Chief Electoral Officer and the Commonwealth Electoral Officers for the States were appointed and promoted under the ordinary processes of the then *Public Service Act 1922* (the Public Service Act) applying to second division officers.

3.3 In his second reading speech for the *Australian Electoral Office Act 1973* Minister Daly advised the House that:

At present the Chief Electoral Officer has statutory powers, but he holds office under the Public Service ${\rm Act.}^4$

3.4 The speech and the new Act referred to staff other than the new statutory officers continuing to be employed under the Public Service Act. Neither the speech nor the debate in either House referred specifically to the then current manner of appointing the Chief Electoral Officer or the Commonwealth Electoral Officers for the States.

3.5 The Australian Electoral Office Act 1973 established the Australian Electoral Office as a statutory authority with eight statutory officers appointed by the Governor-General. Those were the Chief Australia Electoral Officer, Deputy Chief Australian Electoral Officer and the Australian Electoral Officers for the six States.

3.6 The first report of the Joint Select Committee on Electoral Reform (the basis of the major 1983-84 reforms) stated at paragraph 2.6 that:

... The [Australian Electoral Office] Act provides for 8 statutory officers ... officers are appointed to these positions by the Governor-General. In practice, therefore, appointments to these positions are determined by Cabinet.

3.7 While the 1983-84 amendments formed the AEC, the process of appointing the Electoral Commissioner, Deputy Electoral Commissioner and Australian Electoral Officers appeared to continue generally as occurred under the *Australian Electoral Office Act 1973*.

Preparation of the writs

3.8 The JSCEM asked about the history of the preparation of the writs, and about any additional arguments as to why the writs should be prepared by a body other than the AEC.

3.9 In submission 147, the AEC argued that:

A more appropriate organisation for the preparation of the writs might be the Office of Legislative Drafting (OLD), who are already responsible for the preparation of Proclamations, Regulations and other formal documents. OLD could receive written instructions from PM&C, who are best placed to advise the relevant dates in a timely manner...⁵

3.10 OLD is a specialist legal drafting office servicing all Commonwealth agencies. One of OLD's functions is to draft non legislative instruments, of which the writs would be an example.

3.11 Essentially, in making this suggestion, the AEC is requesting that the writs, which are important legal documents, be drafted by appropriate professionals using formal advice from the relevant source. This does not currently occur.

3.12 The AEC has been preparing the writs since its formation in 1984. It is probable that prior to 1984, the writs were prepared by the Australian Electoral Office.

AEC funding

3.13 The JSCEM asked about the magnitude of funding cuts to the AEC in the 1996-97 Budget.

3.14 The appropriation structure in place in 1996-97 was different to that in place now. Running costs funding was separated from funding for the conduct of elections. The response below covers the range of appropriations for services that were available at that time.

3.15 Total Appropriations recorded in the Portfolio Budget Statements and Additional Estimates fell from \$161.0m in 1995-96 to \$98.9m in 1996-97, a difference of \$62.1m. This was due mainly to the funding in 1995-96 of the election held on the 2nd March 1996.

Running Costs

3.16 Funding of running costs fell by a net \$0.9m, from \$69.2m in 1995-96 to \$68.3m in 1996-97. Base running costs were cut by an efficiency dividend of 1% (\$0.6m), an across-the-board reduction of 2% in running costs (\$1.2m) and a \$2m removal of funding for the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Electoral Information Service (ATSIEIS). That is, a total funding cut of \$3.8m. The AEC did receive a range of small funding supplements to cover increased costs for employee salary conditions and indexation, hence the lower overall movement in total running costs funding above.

Event Funding

3.17 Program costs relating to the conduct of Commonwealth elections and industrial ballots fell by \$48.7m, from \$56.9m in 1995-96 to \$8.2m in 1996-97. Initial funding of \$8.5m was received in 1996-97 for the conduct of the election of the delegates to the Constitutional Convention.

Electoral Roll Review

3.18 Electoral roll review funding was increased by \$12.6m, from \$1.1m in 1995-96 to \$13.7m in 1996-97 due to the cycle of review activity.

4. Polling booth noise

4.1 The JSCEM asked whether the *Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918* (the Act) could be amended to make excessive noise (including political broadcasting) at polling booths illegal.

4.2 Legal advice sought from the Office of General Counsel (OGC) suggests that the Act could be amended to make excessive noise (including political broadcasting) at polling places on polling day illegal. However, such an amendment would raise the issue of constitutional protection afforded to political communication in Australia. As the High Court made clear in *Lange v Australian Broadcasting Corporation* (1997)⁶ the scope of the protection must meet two conditions. First, the object of the law must be compatible with the maintenance of the constitutionally prescribed system of representative and responsible government. Second, the prescribed law must be reasonably appropriate and adapted to achieving a legitimate object or end of government.

4.3 Legal advice from OGC suggests that generally, regulating noise at a polling place would not breach the implied freedom of political communication inherent in the *Commonwealth Constitution*. More specifically, OGC suggest that regulating noise could best be achieved by inserting a new provision into the Act prohibiting excessive noise (including political broadcasting).

4.4 To enable the effective operation of such a provision, it could restrict its scope to particular means of communication and the content of the communication. For example, the provision could proscribe the use of electronic (or any broadcasting) devices used to broadcast electoral matter. To comply with general principles of freedom of political communication, the provision would have to be limited to a defined time period (say 8 am to 6 pm on polling day) and be confined to prescribed places (polling places). Moreover, the provision would have to define the limit to which the proscribed activity extended beyond the polling place.

4.5 Further, a provision of this type of would need to consider the scope of the power of authorised officers to regulate this sort of activity beyond pre-existing definitions of polling booths and polling places.

5. Call centres

5.1 The JSCEM asked the AEC to elaborate on what the National Call Centre was designed for, the kinds of questions asked of call centre staff, and whether the call centre has adequately fulfilled its purpose.

5.2 A national call centre was established in 1996 to handle the growing number of telephone enquiries generated by successive electoral events. This service forms part of the broader public information campaign to assist electors to participate correctly in the electoral process. The public is able to

ask for information about all aspects of the election. The types of questions vary at different times during the election campaign and fall into a number of categories.

5.3 Following the announcement of the election, the questions relate to whether the elector is enrolled, how they can update their enrolment details, and which Division they are enrolled for. During the middle of the election campaign, the questions generally relate to voting options for electors who are going to be away on polling day, and when and where an elector can vote. Near polling day, the questions generally relate to where the elector's nearest polling place is.

5.4 The AEC believes that a dedicated National Call Centre is an essential component of its operations during general election and referendum events, and accordingly the National Call Centre has fulfilled its purpose since 1996. An outsourced National Call Centre enables the AEC to respond to the very large volume of telephone enquiries that occur uniquely during election periods, allowing staff including Divisional staff to focus on time critical election preparations and activity.

5.5 While the AEC believes that the Centre has adequately fulfilled its purpose (and various improvements have been implemented since its inception), further technical, staffing and management enhancements are being prepared for the next federal election. In-principle agreement has been reached for Centrelink to provide the National Call Centre function at the next electoral event. Centrelink's demonstrated technical capacity, its legislated role as the service delivery arm of the Commonwealth and its commitment to high standards of accuracy and client service as opposed to commercial considerations are key factors that the AEC has taken into account in reaching this agreement.

5.6 The JSCEM asked the AEC to provide information on the internal evaluation of the call centre and its operation in 2001.

5.7 The internal evaluation determined that the call centre service provided by United Customer Management Solutions (UCMS) had involved problems of a technical nature together with issues related to staffing, training, liaison and accuracy of information. The consequence of that assessment was that alternative call centre solutions would be examined for future events. As discussed above, the AEC has reached an in principle agreement with Centrelink for the provision of call centre services for the next federal event.

5.8 Performance related issues were discussed by senior staff of the AEC and contracted operator at various stages during and after the election campaign. After careful consideration and advice, the AEC decided not to pursue legal action in the courts. This decision was made mindful of the significant costs and resources necessary to follow this course of action, the fact that UCMS incurred a financial loss on the project, and whilst not timely to the AEC, attempts had been made by UCMS to rectify the situation.

5.9 The JSCEM requested some clarification of the figures for calls answered and missed by the AEC call centre for the 1998 federal election. There is a discrepancy between the figures provide during the 1998 federal election inquiry, which were part of a discussion about the level of usage of the call centre,⁷ and the figures provided at Table 6 of the 7 February 2003 submission on general questions on notice, which were the result of a request for comparative figures for the 1998 and 2001 federal election.

5.10 The 1998 Call Centre figures contained in the latest submission to the JSCEM are the more accurate.

5.11 The disparity in the figures is related to the capturing of more detailed statistics in 2001 (following advancements in technology) and the re-analysis of the 1998 figures using the same Telstra software to ensure more relevant and accurate comparative figures.

5.12 Specifically, in 1998 statistics for answered calls were calculated on the basis of calls that entered the queue of the management information system (MIS). At that time, the complexity and cost precluded the further break down of figures to separately identify calls that were disconnected by the caller and calls that dropped out. Accordingly, all calls that entered the MIS queue were calculated as answered.

Public awareness campaign expenditure

5.13 The JSCEM asked the AEC to provide extended explanations of some of the headings contained in Table 4 of the 7 February 2003 submission responding to general questions on notice. In particular, the headings requiring explanation were: Advertising; Education and Information Services; Enquiry Services; and Media and Results Centre.

5.14 A breakdown of advertising expenditure is contained at Table 5 of the 7 February 2003 submission responding to general questions on notice. The other headings are explained as follows:

- Education and Information Service covers the pre-election remote area enrolment and information campaign, for example targeting indigenous electors with educational activities undertaken by special AEC liaison officers over the period;
- Enquiry Services includes the National Call Centre service; and
- the Media and Results Centre consists of State based Election night results centres where AEC staff assist media with results enquiries.

6. Pre poll ordinary voting

6.1 The JSCEM asked for a comparison of the current process for dealing with pre poll (declaration) votes and the process that might be followed should the JSCEM accept the AEC's recommendation to make pre poll voting within the elector's home Division ordinary voting.⁸

Current processes

6.2 Pre poll votes are currently issued as declaration votes at Divisional offices, pre poll voting centres and interstate voting centres.

6.3 Pre poll votes are issued in a fashion similar to an absent vote. The elector is asked to complete their name and enrolled address details on a pre poll declaration certificate. The issuing officer determines the elector's Division by looking up the elector's enrolled address in the Division Finder (pre poll voting centres are provided with Division Finders for each of the six States and two mainland Territories). The issuing officer issues the elector with a House of Representatives ballot paper for their Division and a Senate ballot paper for their State or Territory.

6.4 The declaration certificate is signed by the elector and witnessed by the issuing officer. The issuing officer extracts a counterfoil from the declaration certificate envelope and files the counterfoil as a record that the elector voted.

6.5 The elector completes the ballot papers and returns them to the issuing officer. The issuing officer places the ballot papers in the declaration certificate envelope, seals the envelope and places it in a ballot box. Pre poll voting centres usually have one or more ballot boxes for 'home' Division pre poll votes, a ballot box for intrastate pre poll votes and, depending upon the proximity of the pre poll votes. As the ballot boxes are used over several days, they are of a more robust polypropylene construction than the cardboard ballot boxes used in polling places on polling day.

6.6 At the close of each day that the pre poll voting centre is in operation (except for polling day), the OIC seals the ballot boxes and reconciles the counterfoils and the ballot papers issued for the day. Sealed ballot boxes and unused ballot papers are placed in secure storage overnight. If possible the material will be returned to the Divisional Office, otherwise arrangements will have been made with the police, a bank, the post office or a local government authority office for secure storage.

6.7 After the close of polls on polling day a complete reconciliation is made of all pre poll votes issued by the Divisional Office, pre poll voting centre or interstate voting centre. Pre poll votes must be sorted to the Division for which the elector claims enrolment. Pre poll votes are then exchanged with other Divisions. Pre poll votes, either issued by the 'home' Division or by other Divisions, must then go through preliminary scrutiny in order to determine whether the elector can be marked off the roll. Only then can the declaration certificate envelope be opened and the ballot papers counted.

6.8 It can take several days for all pre poll votes to pass through preliminary scrutiny and for the ballot papers to be counted. This includes those pre poll votes issued by the Division for the Division, which usually represent the vast majority of pre poll votes issued by a Division.

Proposed processes

6.9 Pre poll votes would be issued as ordinary votes for electors voting at a Divisional Office or pre poll voting centre located within the Division for which they are enrolled.

6.10 Pre poll votes would continue to be issued as declaration votes for electors voting at a Divisional Office or pre poll voting centre located in a Division, other than the Division for which they are enrolled (absent pre poll votes and interstate pre poll votes) and for electors who claimed local

enrolment but could not be found on the certified list (provisional pre poll votes).

6.11 When an elector entered a pre poll voting centre they would be asked if they were a local elector or an absent or interstate elector.

6.12 Absent and interstate electors would be directed to an absent issuing point and issued a pre poll vote using the same processes described above.

6.13 Local electors would be directed to ordinary issuing points. They would be asked their name and address and their name would be located on a certified list for the Division. Their name would be marked off the certified list and they would be issued with a House of Representatives ballot paper and a Senate ballot paper. The completed ballot papers would be placed in a ballot box. The completed ballot papers **would not** be placed in a declaration certificate envelope.

6.14 If the elector's name could not be located on the certified list they would be directed to the absent issuing point and they would be issued a pre poll vote using the current processes. If it could be identified that they were actually enrolled in another Division they would be issued with an absent or interstate pre poll vote as appropriate. Electors who claimed local enrolment but could not be found on the certified list would be issued a provisional pre poll vote.

6.15 By issuing ordinary, absent and provisional votes a pre poll voting centre would perform the same functions as a polling place on polling day.

6.16 At the close of each day that the pre poll voting centre was in operation, the OIC would seal the ballot boxes and reconcile the ballot papers issued for the day and the counterfoils for absent, interstate and provisional pre poll votes. Sealed ballot boxes, certified lists and unused ballot papers would be placed in secure storage overnight (the Divisional Office if possible, otherwise with the police, a bank, the post office or a local government authority office).

6.17 After polling day there would still be a necessity to sort and exchange pre poll votes issued for other Divisions. Pre poll votes issued by other Divisions would still be declaration votes, and as such must go through preliminary scrutiny (in order to determine whether the elector can be marked off the roll) prior to the declaration certificate envelope being opened and the ballot papers counted.

6.18 All those pre poll votes issued as ordinary votes (those issued by the Division for the Division) would already have been marked off the certified list at the time the vote was issued. These votes, which represent the majority of pre poll votes issued, could be counted as soon as polls closed on polling day. A large number of extra votes, in addition to those cast as ordinary votes in polling places, could therefore be counted on election night and included in the preliminary results. This would result in an earlier determination of the result in many Divisions and some financial efficiencies.
