I wish to submit my proposal of **STRAIGHT ELECTION SYSTEM** as a model for the future **State** and **Federal** elections in Australia.

- The present electoral system is open for manipulation with references and the final votes often goes to the Parties what is on opposition for what the individual elector believes.
- The Straight Election is much Cheaper and quicker to perform and saves millions of dollars for the States and Federal Government.
- There is not much to complain about foul play afterwards because the electors can vote only one (their) favorite Party.
- The writer is here using the Western Australian state election as a model because despite several requests for the last Federal Election results, the requests have been ignored by the Australian Electoral Commission both in Western Australia and in Canberra.
- It should be beneficial to let some few persons to do comparable study with the Federal Election results with preferences and one with the Straight Election System. In previous Submissions there have been much of complaints but very few alternative choices for the elections. The results could be surprising and startling for many.

• The first 7 parties are chosen according to the previous amount of votes they accrued at the last election. The order on the Ballot Paper is drawn by lot, as it has been in practice in the earlier elections. In every State the independents are given special identification number to see how many votes each individual have got in the election. When all votes for the Independents are added together, the seat belongs to the Independent with most votes. As practiced for other Parties.

Model for the STRAIGHT ELECTION SYSTEM FOR STATE AND FEDERAL ELECTIONS.

It works as follows:

The enrolled electors must be so close as possible each other in every electorate to avoid injustices in allocations of seats for the Candidates in the final count.

The Parties should nominate Candidates for **every** electorates to make it easier to make the final division of the seats for all Parties.

The elector have thus the possibility to vote his/hers favorite Party in every electorate where he/she is living in the election day.

Only this way we can find out whom the total constituency wants to be in the Parliament. The votes are one vote one value in every electorate. No special areas or powers allowed in any electorate. **The elector can vote for one Party only. Not any preferences allowed for any other Parties.** The total number of votes in a State divided by the number of seats in the Parliament is the Quotient for one seat. Each Party's total vote divided by the Quotient, is their number of seats in the Parliament. The biggest Party provide the State Premier or the Prime Minister in the federal election and the the Government should consist over 50% of votes from one or several Parties. The **Federal election** is performed same way as the **State elections** with the difference that the surplus votes from every State are added together for each Party and the biggest surpluses get the seats in the Parliament. The model to do it is available from the writer.

This shows that the ALP as a biggest Party should have minimun 29 Representants in their Government. It could be 21 ALP,2 Democrats, 4 Greens and 2 or 3 others. It clearly shows that the mandate is not always so secure but needs to be negotiated with other Parties.

The one vote one value STRAIGHT election system always bring same results whether the electorates are of same size or not. To make it more equal and just for the candidates in the final count of seats, there should be as little as possible any exess malapportionment in the different seats in a State Also , as mentioned earlier, the electors must have the possibility to vote his favorite Party in every electorate. In every electorates there is supporters for all Parties and the Parties must have the right to collect all Party votes to the final count.

.The Western Australian and the Federal election system is due for an overhaul because the election results are not fair and just for the electors.

The final surpluses now are 5.7% from all votes counted. That is coming mainly from the group of Independents whom we can not handle as the other Parties. If we can do it in the future, by some arrangement, the final surplus vote could be much less. Now it should be only ~1.2% from all votes.

The following model presents the division of the seats by using the STRAIGHT election system: It has done by using a special ELIMINATION METHOD to get the Representant to every electorate. Every Party have the final number of votes. Each time when the seat is given to a certain Candidate, the Quotient 18012.6 is taken out from the final Party number. When the final Quotient has been used, all other votes for that Party are eliminated. (wiped out) Only the surplus number is left on the bottom of the column. This time they are left for clarity. The elimination process starts from the biggest Party and then next biggest and so on, until all seats have been given out. The writer like to show it to interested people. It should help a lot if every Party have a full number of Candidates, the Independents acts as a group and every elector have the right to vote his/hers favorite Party in their electorate. The results are very easy to calculate and it should save millions to every State or Federal Goverments in Australia.New Party registration should be kept same as now. It is quite fair. When doing the elimination, put all Parties in same row and check that there is not any other candidate already elected in that electorate. Then move to the next number down on the Party list what you are doing Eventually you'll find the place for all the seats what each Party are allocated to have.All small Parties should have won some seats. Every Party must be fitted in to the Parliament if the numbers shows that they are eligible to do it. Last election was performed in the old way. Surely the STRAIGHT election system will be accepted by the people if someone presents it to them in a right way.

All Parties are arranged to the descending list first to make the Elimination easier. Also the Parties are not losing any votes for other Parties by the preferences. They are using only their own votes. **Preferences not alloved in the STRAIGHT election system.**

As we see in the ELIMINATION model, the Party who wins the seat, put their full Quotient for that seat thus eliminating all other Parties in that electorate. In doing that they cannibalise their own votes elsewhere of their Party list, thus making room for the other smaller Parties in that area. This election system is looking first for the Parties and how many seats they can have in the final count. The electorates are of minor importance but of course all electorates must have the Representant to represent that area. One big advantage is that there is very small number of wasted votes. Practically all votes are used for someone's benefit. Anything new must be experimented in practice first to see how practical it is and corrected if anything is wrong. The main thing is that we stay within the limit of the **STRAIGHT election system**. Small variations are allowed. This system is good for any Party, big or small, because it eliminates all sorts of manipulation by references. From now on every Party must rely on their good reputation only to be in favour of their electorates.
