This submission is in response to the JSCEM's invitation for public comment as part of its Inquiry into the Conduct of the 2001 Federal Election.

I left Australia in 1985 when I was 17 years old, on a 5-year scholarship to study in Japan. I lived in Japan for a total of 9 years, and since then have been living in the US for the past 8 years. I came from NW Tasmania in the Braddon electorate.

Since I was not yet 18 when I left Australia, I was not on the Electoral Roll and never have been. I knew that I was not obligated to register as an overseas voter, but I had no idea that if I wished to vote I had to register within 2 years of departure.

For about the past 10 years I have owned properties and other investments in Tasmania and pay taxes in Australia. I visit Australia at least once a year to spend time with family and check on investments.

These days it is so easy to follow Australian news via the Internet. I receive daily updates via the web, and I also subscribe to two Australian magazines.

I plan to return to Australia within the next 5 years, so naturally I am concerned about changes affecting the lifestyle of Australian residents. The fact that I was not able to participate in the last elections, and cannot do so in future ones until I am able to reside in Australia and re-apply for registration, is very frustrating. I do not think there needs to be any time restriction on overseas voter registration. It seems surprising that Australia, as a developed and 'wired' country which requires all residents to vote, should place such restrictions on overseas residents. ALL Australian citizens should have the right to vote.
