Key Information

Gamilaraay is a suffixing language. Sounds are added to the end of words. Suffixes are a sound or combination of sounds that add meaning to a word.

For example in English - 'In Tamworth' translates as 'Tamworth-ga' in Gamilaraay.

There is a suffix table on the last page of this booklet. You need to learn the patterns.

In this lesson we are looking at 'place' suffixes. Note that the suffix changes depending on the final sound of the word.

Suffixes

Suffixes	endings to words that slightly change the meaning
Gamilaraay	English
Gunabarabin <mark>-da</mark>	at / in Coonabarabran
Wagga Wagga- <mark>ga</mark>	at / in Wagga Wagga
Galariinbaraay- <mark>dha</mark>	at / in Collarenabri
Blue Haven- <mark>da</mark>	at / in Blue Haven
Tamworth- <mark>ga</mark>	at/in Tamworth
