Inquiry into school libraries and teacher librarians in Australian schools

1. The impact of recent policies and investments on school libraries and their activities

I have been a teacher for many years in the Public School System and am a very strong advocate for the importance of keeping teacher librarians pro-active in our schools.

A change in timetabling unfortunately turned our library sessions into RFF (Release from Face to Face Teaching). This is occurred to create an additional non teaching Deputy Principal position. I have elected not to take RFF during my library sessions, preferring to draw on the wonderful skills of our Teacher-Librarian and assess and evaluate my students under her tutelage. Not all schools have the luxury of such a wonderful mentor, lets hope that our government appreciates the importance of their role in the community just as much as my students and I do. Libraries and Teacher-Librarians do contribute to improved educational and community outcomes, especially literacy. Regards,

School libraries need the combined skills of teachers who have deep knowledge of curriculum documents and pedagogy and librarians who know how to access and organise information and this exists in the position of Teacher-Librarian. The policy in NSW to use the Teacher-Librarian as a provider of RFF (Release from Face to Face) means Teacher-Librarians can no longer work as learning partners with class teachers. The only effective way to teach information skills – which are vital as students try to navigate the enormous quantities of information available on every topic – is as a part of class work and not in isolation. There is no school subject in the Primary syllabus called 'library' and yet students are sent to library lessons each week and important skills are being taught in isolation from the curriculum. This is not an effective use of the skills of the Teacher Librarian nor does it benefit our students.

After twenty years of co-operative work by the Teacher-Librarian with class teachers, in my school the Teacher-Librarian position has been reduced to 100% RFF in order to create a Non Teaching Deputy Principal. This position is additional to our entitlement of one teaching Deputy and one Non Teaching

Deputy. Staffing decisions of such importance should not be left to school Principals.

I would like the following to be considered

- collect national data on school library staffing, funding, and scheduling;
- tie funding so that states can and must adequately staff and fund school library programs and services;
- develop national school library standards including staffing standards

5. The impact and potential of digital technologies to enhance and support the roles of school libraries and librarians.
