Introduction

1. Under the provisions of standing order 216 by which the committee is established, the committee is required, as soon as practicable after each 31 December, to prepare and table in the House a report on its operations in connection with the registration and declaration of Members' interests during that year.
2. This is the report of the committee for the calendar year 2025.

Responsibilities of the committee

3. Standing order 216 sets out the following terms of reference for the committee:
 - (a) A Committee of Privileges and Members' Interests shall be appointed to:
 - (i) inquire into and report on complaints of breach of privilege or contempt which may be referred to it by the House under *standing order 51* or by the Speaker under *standing order 52*, or any other related matter referred to it by or in accordance with a resolution of the House;
 - (ii) consider and report on serious breach findings which may be referred to it by the Independent Parliamentary Standards Commission;
 - (iii) inquire into and report on the arrangements made for the compilation, maintenance and accessibility of a Register of Members' Interests;
 - (iv) consider proposals by Members and others on the form and content of the Register of Members' Interests;
 - (v) consider specific complaints about registering or declaring interests;
 - (vi) consider possible changes to any code of conduct adopted by the House; and
 - (vii) consider whether specified persons (other than Members) ought to be required to register and declare their interests.
 - (b) The committee shall consist of 13 members: the Leader of the House or his or her nominee, the Deputy Leader of the Opposition or his or her nominee, and 11 other members (six government Members, four opposition Members and one crossbench Member). When the Opposition is composed of two parties, the non-government Members shall consist of at least one member of the smaller opposition party.
 - (c) The committee may call for witnesses and documents, but when considering a matter concerning the registration or declaration of Members' interests it must not exercise that power or undertake an investigation of a person's private interests unless the action is approved by at least seven members of the committee other than the Chair.

(d) The committee may report when it sees fit, and must report to the House on its operations in connection with the registration and declaration of Members' interests during the year as soon as possible after 31 December each year.

4. A report in accordance with these terms of reference follows.

Arrangements made for the compilation, maintenance and accessibility of the Register

5. Since 1986 arrangements approved by the committee provide that the Register may be inspected, by appointment, between 10 am and 12 noon and 2 pm and 4 pm on working days in the office of the Registrar. In addition the Registrar may grant permission for the Register to be inspected outside those hours if the Registrar is satisfied that the circumstances surrounding the request warrant the exercise of such a discretion.

6. Statements of Members' interests have been published on the Parliament's website since the commencement of the 43rd Parliament. This has been a very significant change to accessibility of the statements.

7. The physical Register was inspected four times in 2025. The Register's homepage on the Parliament of Australia website was viewed 48,377 times during the year.

Proposals made by Members and others on the form and content of the Register

8. There were no proposals to alter the form and content of the Register in 2025.

Specific complaints made about the registering or declaring of interests

9. The committee did not receive any complaints about the registering or declaring of interests in 2025.

Changes to any code of conduct

10. On 10 October 2024, the House approved a Behaviour Code for Australian Parliamentarians, with effect from 14 October 2024. There were no changes to the Code in 2025.

11. The Independent Parliamentary Standards Commission (IPSC), established under the *Parliamentary Workplace Support Service Act 2023*, commenced operation on 14 October 2024. The IPSC has responsibility for receiving complaints and investigating alleged breaches of the Behaviour Code, and determining outcomes within its powers.
12. A Parliamentary Joint Committee on Parliamentary Standards was established under the *Parliamentary Workplace Support Service Act 2023*, with a role in considering proposed recommendations for the appointment of Commissioners to the IPSC, reviewing the operation and effectiveness of the Behaviour Code, providing parliamentary oversight of the performance by the Commissioners of their functions, and reporting to both Houses of Parliament on any matter connected with the performance of the IPSC or the Commissioners.
13. During 2025, the IPSC briefed the Committee of Privileges and Members' Interests on its work and its potential interactions with the Committee, which must consider matters referred by the IPSC where particular sanctions are recommended against a Member.

Registration of interests by other classes of person

14. No issues were considered in this area during the year.
