### **Senator Polley** asked:

In regard to the measures that are part of the dementia package - a \$268 million package over five years - which includes more support for timely diagnosis of dementia in primary care and expansion of the scope of dementia behaviour management advisory services. Please provide an update on the implementation of these important measures.

#### Answer:

The Department is progressing implementation of the dementia package announced as part of aged care reform including these particular initiatives:

- The Dementia Behaviour Management Advisory Services have been expanded to include service provision within primary and acute care settings.
- Contractual negotiations are underway for an audit of dementia training and resources to identify gaps in the primary care sector as a preliminary step in developing appropriate support for more timely diagnosis of dementia.

A range of other activities under the package are also underway including:

- The Australian Commission for Safety and Quality in Health Care is well advanced on a project to promote the National Safety and Quality Health Service Standards, as they relate to the care of people with cognitive impairment, in the acute care setting, through the development of a handbook. The handbook will be in three formats, specifically tailored for clinicians, managers and consumers.
- Funding has been provided for a national evidence based consultation service on the design and development of acute care environments that are sympathetic to people with cognitive impairment. The programme has been successfully delivered.
- An audit of training and education resources currently available for acute care staff is being undertaken. This audit will assist in identifying what is available for the sector and any gaps in resources.
- Alzheimer's Australia have been contracted to roll out a national network of younger onset dementia key workers. Key Workers act as a single point of contact for people with younger onset dementia, their carers and family, helping them to access the care and support services most appropriate for their needs. There are currently 42 key workers operating nationally.
- A Dementia and Severe Behaviours Supplement has been implemented in residential aged care and a Dementia and Cognitive Supplement has been implemented in Home Care Packages, with effect from August 2013.
