Senator Kim Carr asked:

Wouldn't a common age-eligibility date obviate this problem? If the Government is not inclined to move to a common age-eligibility date, why is it not so inclined?

Answer:

The *National Disability Insurance Scheme Act 2013* (NDIS Act) imposes a limitation that only persons aged under 65 can make a request to become a participant. This limitation was based on the advice of the Productivity Commission in 2011.

Progressive implementation of the scheme by age and geography during transition has been agreed with each individual state and territory to ensure the orderly implementation and long term sustainability of the scheme.

The implementation of the NDIS Act as the NDIS rolls out means that only those people who make a request to become a participant when they are under 65 will be eligible. Those people aged 65 years and over who are currently receiving supports will be provided with continuity of support to ensure they achieve the same level of outcomes that they are currently achieving. Those people 65 years and over who are not currently receiving services will receive support through the Aged Care system.
