Dear Senator Scullion

I am writing in response to correspondence from you to the Secretary of my Department, Mr Finn Pratt PSM and to the Secretaries of a number of Australian Government Departments. You requested a list of all Indigenous programs and a range of information about those programs.

It is appropriate and common practice that correspondence seeking information about the administration of government programs should be directed to Ministers, not Secretaries. As such, I am responding on behalf of relevant portfolio Ministers.

The Australian Government is committed to public accountability in relation to Indigenous programs, to ensure they are properly targeted and effective in overcoming Indigenous disadvantage. Through portfolio Budget statements, departmental annual reports, the Prime Minister's annual Closing the Gap Statement and COAG reporting processes, we have established strong monitoring and accountability arrangements.

The Government is making unprecedented investments to Close the Gap, to overcome decades of under-investment in services and infrastructure in both mainstream and Indigenous specific programs. This includes major investments in housing, Indigenous health, education and employment.

Information about Indigenous programs is available in relevant Portfolio Budget Statements and is available at <a href="http://www.budget.gov.au">http://www.budget.gov.au</a> and in Departmental annual reports which are available on each Department's website. I have attached a list of Indigenous programs for my Department, which are publicly available on the sites identified, for your reference.

Senators can, of course, seek information relating to Budget estimates through the Budget estimates process, including through questions on notice. As is normal practice, officials will be available to answer detailed questions in relation to appropriations at the forthcoming Estimates Hearing. You also have the opportunity to direct parliamentary questions on notice to Ministers.

To administer statutory royalty equivalent monies calculated from royalties paid to Government from mining on Aboriginal land in the Northern Territory under the Aboriginal Land Rights (Northern Territory) Act 1976, consistent with the FMA Act. The Aboriginals Benefit Account (ABA) funds are held in trust and distributed for the benefit of Aboriginal people living in the Northern Territory.
