#### **Question:**

a) Senator CAMERON: ... There are 598 service centres in regional and remote Australia?
Ms Campbell: There are 598 service centres in total in Australia.

Senator CAMERON: Are many of those in regional and remote Australia?

Ms Campbell: A number are in regional and remote. We would have to look at what the definition of regional and remote is to get a breakdown of the number that are in the urban areas.

Senator CAMERON: I think your annual report described regional and remote. On notice, could you give me a definition of regional and remote from the department's perspective.

- b) How many jobs in these service centres, under the definition, are involved and ...
- c) ... could there be job losses if Australia Post took over that face-to-face approach?

#### **Answer:**

a) As at 1 July 2013, 262 of the department's services centres were located in regional or remote Australia according to the Accessibility/Remoteness Index of Australia (ARIA), endorsed by the Australian Bureau of Statistics and recognised as a nationally consistent measure of geographic remoteness. ARIA categorises localities into five 'remoteness areas': metro cities; inner regional; outer regional; remote; and very remote. The table below provides the number of service centres in each category.

Remoteness Area	Service Centres

Outer Regional	77
Remote	21
Very Remote	22
