Senator Urquhart asked:

Senator URQUHART: Thanks. Can you give us an update on Cape York and, within that, the consultation with the Indigenous people?

Mr Johnston: That is a process that is being run by Queensland.

Senator URQUHART: So the Queensland state? Mr Johnston: The Queensland state; that is right.

Senator URQUHART: So there is no involvement from the Commonwealth on that? Mr Johnston: No. We are not involved in the consultations. We were having some discussions early on with Queensland about the scoping of their project, but I do not think we have been having those for the last couple of months. I can take that on notice and confirm. Senator URQUHART: That would be great.

Answer:

- 1. The Queensland Government is responsible for progressing the Cape York World Heritage process as set out in the 2009 Intergovernmental Agreement on World Heritage.
- 2. The Queensland Department of Environment and Heritage Protection will consult with Traditional Owners and stakeholders on potential World Heritage options.
- 3. The Department of the Environment and Energy has not provided funding to any Indigenous groups for consultation under the current World Heritage process.
- 4. A World Heritage nomination of an area, or areas, of Cape York will only proceed with broad stakeholder support.
