It has got some modelling around flow-on effects to various industries and food security. I would be interested to know on notice.

In relation to the second question, I will throw to Ms Schweizer. Ms Schweizer: The reporting back—and I have confirmed this with one of the officers who was there—Minister Hunt himself did not raise the Taiji dolphin hunts in the short meeting he had with Commissioner Morishita. They did talk about Southern Ocean research whaling. I have not been able to ascertain whether any of the other officers would have raised it but it would seem to be unlikely.
