Senator Peris asked:

- 1. What punitive measures might the company face in the way of prosecution?
- 2. Media reports state the company could be fined over \$8 million, is that so?
- 3. Under what statute would the company be prosecuted?

Answer:

- 1. Penalties under national environment law, the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999* include:
 - for an action taken without approval that is likely to impact matters of national environmental significance, civil penalties of up to \$900,000 for an individual and \$9 million for a body corporate, or criminal penalties of seven years imprisonment and/or a penalty of \$75,600.
 - for an action taken without approval that is likely to impact on Commonwealth land, civil penalties of up to \$180,000 for an individual or up to \$1.8 million for a body corporate, or criminal penalties of up to two years imprisonment and/or a penalty of \$21,600.

In addition to the civil and criminal penalties outlined above, there are a range of alternative enforcement mechanisms available under the Act including requirements to remediate or compensate for environmental damage.

- 2. While the Act provides for substantial penalties (see 1), it would be premature to speculate about the outcome of an investigation which is at an early stage.
- 3. The Department is investigating a potential breach of the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999.*
