Are you aware of those?</p> <p>Dr Smith: Yes.</p> <p>Senator O'NEILL: Do they represent the most complete and recent holding of NBN electorate briefs in the department's possession?</p> <p>Ms Flannery: They were the briefs that responded to the specific FOI request, which was at a particular point in time.</p> <p>Senator O'NEILL: My question is, are they the most recent holdings of NBN electoral briefs or not?</p> <p>Ms Flannery: They would not be, because they responded to a specific request which was at a point in time.</p> <p>Senator O'NEILL: If I understand you clearly, there is more recent data that you have access to?</p> <p>Ms Flannery: That could be the case, but that is outside of the FOI space.</p> <p>Mr Robinson: Ms Flannery looks after the FOI requests. We will have to take on notice whether we have done some since. We may not have. I am not aware of it, so we will have to take it on notice.</p> <p>Senator O'NEILL: Have electorate briefs for every federal electorate in Australia been prepared?</p> <p>Mr Robinson: I would have to take that on notice.</p> <p>Senator O'NEILL: Could you explain the structure of those briefs? 4.	1.1	Senator O'Neill	Digital Productivity – report IT use and Productivity	<p>Senator O'NEILL: I understand that the function for digital productivity was transferred out of the department in September 2015.</p> <p>Ms O'Loughlin: That is correct.</p> <p>Senator O'NEILL: Can you explain to me, then, why the department in February 2016 published a 116 page report on IT use and productivity?</p> <p>Ms O'Loughlin: From memory, that report had been developed in the department for a considerable length of time. As it was ready to go, and through discussions with our colleagues in the innovation department, we settled the report and we published it, because we thought it would be useful information to be made available publicly.</p> <p>Senator O'NEILL: Could you indicate to me the date when that project was initiated?</p> <p>Ms O'Loughlin: I will have to take that on notice. I can probably come back to you later today of that.</p> <p>Senator O'NEILL: That would be good. Could you also undertake to provide, if possible today, the cost and the time associated with the preparation and publication of that report?</p> <p>Ms O'Loughlin: Yes.</p> <p>Senator O'NEILL: AusTender contract notice CN3363608, entitled 'Digital Productivity Project'. What is this for?</p> <p>Ms O'Loughlin: It is probably related to the report that you mentioned earlier, but I would have to take that on notice.</p>	Page 12

I do not have the exact numbers and names, but we can provide those to you.</p> <p>Senator O'NEILL: Later today?</p> <p>Dr Smith: Yes.</p> <p>Senator O'NEILL: Thank you.</p>	Page 13-14

Because we are unable to continue the lease of our current building, because there is another lease that is currently occupied, we move into that arrangement. So, overall it is ensuring that there is a smaller property footprint across the whole of government.</p> <p>Senator CHISHOLM: But there is nothing definitive in terms of savings?</p> <p>Dr Smith: That is probably a question for Finance.</p> <p>Senator CHISHOLM: Do you think any new lease arrangements are going to constrain the department's ability to do its functions?</p> <p>Ms Talbot: No.</p> <p>Ms O'Loughlin: We will come back on notice on the cost of the lease. I want to know if your department is part of the interdepartmental committee that has just been set up to look at the impact of the STGs in our country and internationally?</p> <p>Dr Smith: Yes, apparently we are.</p> <p>Senator MOORE: Well, it is very new. I will put this on notice, because it is obviously new. I want to find out on notice exactly who is representing your department and your understanding as a department of what your role will be. Also, whether there will be a focus domestically and internationally. There are too many goals. There are a number of goals, but I would have thought that there are a few there where communications expertise would be invaluable.</p> <p>Dr Smith: Certainly.</p>	Page 15

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8.	1.1	Senator Bilyk	Tom Roberts	<p>Senator BILYK: We will try a couple, because some are for the minister as well. Minister, the family for the acclaimed Australian artist Tom Roberts sought to donate a family heirloom. I am sure you are aware of the situation. It was a coin and a handwritten letter. The coin had been minted in 1873 and engraved with the Impressionist painter's initials. They sought to donate that to the prime ministerial collection last December. We know that it went missing somewhere. I am not accusing anyone of any unlawful act; I will be very clear on that. I understand that it was referred to the AFP. Is that correct?</p> <p>Senator Fifield: I am not aware of it. I do not have any specific knowledge. Obviously, I am aware of the issue, but I do not have any specific knowledge as to the handling of it. I stand to be corrected, but I do not think that it is anything that our department has involvement with.</p> <p>Ms O'Loughlin: I will check, but I do not believe our department is involved in that issue.</p> <p>Senator BILYK: I understood that the AFP had done some interviews and things, and that the staff that it had been handed to had resigned. Are you able to clarify that?</p> <p>Ms O'Loughlin: It was a staff member of the then minister's office. So it was not departmental staff.</p> <p>Senator BILYK: Minister, do you know if the previous minister's office staff has resigned?</p> <p>Senator Fifield: As I said, I do not have any specific knowledge of this matter.</p> <p>Senator BILYK: So you would not know whether the minister or the department have met with the family of Tom Roberts about this issue?</p> <p>Ms O'Loughlin: I think it was the responsibility of the former minister.</p> <p>Senator BILYK: That does not absolve the current minister. I mean, if everything is dropped when a minister changed, there would be no accountability anywhere.</p> <p>Ms O'Loughlin: Because that staff member had moved to different offices, we have not been involved in this process since then. I understand, though, that the Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet may have taken some questions on this issue yesterday. I would just like to check with them about whether they have some knowledge of that process.</p> <p>Senator BILYK: The other question I would like to know the answer to is if anybody from the department—obviously, not from the minister's office—has met with the family of Tom Roberts about the loss of these artefacts? Has any offer of compensation been made and, if so, what is that offer? Also, has there been a formal apology? I am a bit surprised to hear that, Minister, to be honest. This is a significant issue and they were significant cultural artefacts from a very respected Australian artist. I am a bit surprised for you to say to me that it was the former minister as though that absolves you of any information or knowledge about it.</p> <p>Senator Fifield: Neither I or my office have had any interaction or involvement in the events in question. It did not involve an interaction with me or my office.</p> <p>Senator BILYK: Even though it is a significant issue around a cultural artefact, as such, and one of Australia's most renowned artists? Are you saying that the blame stopped at the former minister?</p>	Page 16 and Page 95, 96

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				<p>Senator Fifield: No, I am just making a statement of fact that the issues in question did not involve me or my office, or any interaction between me and my office and the parties involved in that matter.</p> <p>Senator BILYK: I think Ms O'Loughlin said she will try to come back to me.</p> <p>Ms O'Loughlin: I recall now that it was a private donation from the individual, and the coin was provided to the Prime Minister at the Tom Roberts function at the National Gallery last year. Hence, I would like to check with the Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet.</p> <p>Senator BILYK: It was then handed to an adviser?</p> <p>Ms O'Loughlin: That is my understanding. That is why the issue had been taken forward by the Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet. It had not come to this department at all. But I am happy to talk to the Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet and see whether any of the people over there have met with the family, or can help with the other parts of your question.</p> <p>Senator BILYK: I do not suppose you are able to tell me then if the staff person is now working in another minister's office? You probably don't know the answer to that, Minister?</p> <p>Senator Fifield: I do not have a whole-of-government perspective on government staffing.</p> <p>...</p> <p>Senator BILYK: Was it going to be displayed in the National Gallery?</p> <p>Ms O'Loughlin: No, it was a private donation.</p> <p>Senator BILYK: Yes, but was it going to be displayed?</p> <p>Ms O'Loughlin: That is not my understanding but, again, as it was a matter for PM&C I am happy to take it on board, follow it up with PM&C and report back to this committee.</p> <p>Senator BILYK: What sort of timeline would that take?</p> <p>Ms O'Loughlin: I am happy to do that hopefully in the next few days.</p> <p>...</p> <p>Senator BILYK: This is a media article where I found the information that the issue had happened. Dr Lisa Roberts, who is a descendent of Tom Roberts, is quoted as saying, 'I'm disappointed. I've done everything that I can to be transparent in my dealings with people but I don't think it's been a two-way street. It's shaken my trust in cultural institutions.' That is where my concern comes in, Minister. They are part of your portfolio, cultural institutions. She goes on say, 'I probably won't donate anything again.' So my question is not only who has spoken to the family but whether there was any compensation suggested. I want to know the whole thing, from go to whoa, about how the family has been treated?</p> <p>Ms O'Loughlin: I am happy to take that up with Prime Minister and Cabinet.</p>	
9.	1.1	Senator Bilyk	Gender Balance on Arts boards	<p>Senator BILYK: Good. I have had a look at the make-up of a number of the boards and cultural institutions, and there seems to be some disparity with gender balance, and some have no appointees from diverse backgrounds. What steps are being taken to ensure that the membership of all boards and councils reflect diversity goals and have gender balance?</p> <p>Senator Fifield: There is a whole-of-government objective to improve gender balance on boards. I</p>	Page 17 and page 19

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				<p>think, taking my portfolio as a whole, both communications—</p> <p>Senator BILYK: I am asking specifically about the arts area.</p> <p>Senator Fifield: I appreciate that, but looking at it on a portfolio basis I think we do well, and officers at the table will be able to give us the statistics on that. But, obviously, I am keen not just to address this on a portfolio-wide basis but also board by board.</p> <p>Ms Talbot: The department is actively working towards the new gender diversity target of a 50 per cent balance on portfolio board positions. We actively monitor the diversity of portfolio board appointments, and the secretary has written to all agency heads advising portfolio agencies of the new gender diversity targets and of the need to be committed and accountable to achieve gender balance on boards. Recently we had to provide results to the whole-of-government <i>Gender balance on Australian government boards report 2015-16</i>. That was for the whole portfolio. We had 45.1 per cent women appointed to boards as at 30 June, 2016. I should note that that does not include managing directors of Australia Post, ABC, SBS and staff-elected positions on the ABC board. The latest results we have for gender balance across the portfolios is that we are now sitting at 47 per cent female, so we have slightly increased since we provided that report. Is there a specific—</p> <p>Senator BILYK: Well, you have said that the agencies had all been contacted. Are you able to tell me which specific agencies, including the national cultural institutions, have diversity and/or disability action plans in place?</p> <p>Ms Talbot: That I do not actually have.</p> <p>Senator BILYK: Can you take that on notice?</p> <p>Ms Talbot: We can take that on notice.</p> <p>Senator BILYK: For those who do not, what plans are there and what is the timing?</p> <p>Ms Talbot: I have to take that on notice, Senator.</p> <p>Senator BILYK: What about organisations that are funded by people such as the Australia Council, Creative Partnerships Australia and Screen Australia? I basically have the same questions to them. Which ones have diversity or disability action plans in place? We know that there was a media report on 25 November 2015. Surely there would have been some conversation given that the previous minister—in terms of his role with this, there would have been some communication from the NBN to the government and establishing what and when that was.</p> <p>Senator Fifield: NBN, as Bill Morrow has indicated previously at estimates, has been trialling and is looking at technology called 'fibre to the distribution point'. He has been very upfront at estimates that that is something that he was looking at and that there were trials taking place to see if that was something that would be appropriate to deploy and to see if that would be a cost-effective option in some situations. I was aware of it because everyone here was aware that that was being looked at as well. So NBN have ultimately taken the decision that, where it could have been an option to use Optus HFC, they will be using different technology solutions.</p> <p>Senator CHISHOLM: I think I am just going to have to be really clear with my question. You had an ultimate merit list of about 507 sites, I think, and the government funded 499.</p> <p>Senator DASTYARI: Yes, I think 507 is the number in here.</p> <p>Mr Paterson: But there would have been a number of sites that would have been considered not to be value for money and not meriting, so they would not have been on that merit list.</p> <p>Senator DASTYARI: Yes.</p> <p>Mr Paterson: If your question is how many points you needed to get to that cut-off, I do not have that information.
