On the 9 December, the Sydney Morning Herald reported that the Treasurer was carrying out modelling on eight tax reform options for consideration by the COAG. Five of these options involved increasing the GST rate or expanding the GST. Two options involved increasing the Medicare levy and one option involved introducing a GST-equivalent financial sector tax. Mr Fraser, are you aware of the work undertaken by Treasury for this modelling? Senator Cormann: Sorry—this is where I have got to answer on behalf of the government. The issue of tax reform is very much a matter for deliberation by the cabinet. Consistent with the practice under your government—and I remember when I was sitting on your side of the table, when you were sitting at this side of the table, Senator Wong. What you would have said to me then, and what I am saying to you now, is that matters that are subject to cabinet deliberations are not properly the subject of these sorts of lines of questioning here in Senate estimates. Until such time as the government has made a decision on the way forward, then, of course, you can go your hardest asking us about the reasons for the decisions and the context and the modelling and whatever—you go your hardest. But, in relation to matters related to tax reform, they are very much a matter for consultation by cabinet. CHAIR: Your point is made, Minister. The point is made. If you continue— Senator WONG: I am allowed to ask questions and we will go to the Senate if you are going to stop me asking questions. I am serious. CHAIR: No, I want you to ask questions. Senator WONG: I am over this. I am entitled to ask process questions. Senator Cormann: You can ask process questions. Senator WONG: Thank you. When did the Treasury first commence modelling options for the COAG? Senator Cormann: We might have to take that on notice. Senator WONG: You seriously cannot tell us that? Was there a unit set up? Was it done in Revenue Group? Was there an IDC? Can you just tell me the personnel structure that was set up for the tax green and white papers, for which, as late as October 2015, Senator Cormann was still outlining a timetable of an early-new-year release of the green paper and a white paper release? Mr Fraser: Preparatory work was done, as I said, drawing off the work in the Re:think document, by Rob Heferen and his tax policy group during the course of 2015. Senator WONG: 2015. So Mr Heferen's group did the work for that. Whatever obfuscation the government wishes to engage in now about what the process actually is, it is unarguable that at least until the end of last year the articulated position of the government was clearly a green paper in the new year and white paper thereafter. Senator Cormann: It is a matter of public record. Senator WONG: Correct. So I am asking: who was responsible for that process? Mr Fraser: Rob Heferen in the tax policy division. Senator WONG: Right. Were you involved in that, Mr Fraser? Mr Fraser: Yes. Senator WONG: What is Treasury's current understanding of the development of the white paper? Mr Fraser: It is a matter for a decision by the government. We will take guidance, obviously, from them. Senator WONG: Right. I assume, because Treasury is a very professional outfit, that you were previously working to the timetable Senator Cormann set out in the previous estimates hearing. Correct? Mr Fraser: We were working on the basis that there might be an option for a green paper and a white paper to be released during the course of 2016. Senator WONG: Are you still working on that basis? Mr Fraser: We are waiting for direction from the government. Senator WONG: When did you move from working on that basis to waiting for direction? Senator Cormann: That is— Senator WONG: That is a perfectly legitimate question. Senator Cormann: Let me just make this point— Senator WONG: That is a process and timing question. Senator Cormann: I want to answer the process question. The government, at all times, is at liberty to change its mind on the best way forward. The government, at all times, is at liberty to make decisions that impact on policy content and on policy development process, subject to the government's assessment of what is in the public interest. Obviously Treasury, and any other department of government, works at the direction of the government of the day. Senator WONG: Thank you for that. I repeat my question: When did Treasury move from working to the timetable that the government had made public—which Senator Cormann reiterated in October 2015: Green paper new year, white paper thereafter—to the position that Mr Fraser now advises which is 'we are waiting for direction'? Who were they? Ms Pascoe: One was Help Save the Furry Ones and the other was White Ridge Rescue Inc.. They were both animal refuge charities. Senator CANAVAN: Were they taken off for noncompliance with forms or— Ms Pascoe: They were the subject of allegations. We investigated, and the end result of those investigations was that we revoked their charitable status. Senator CANAVAN: Okay. You also mentioned an enforceable undertaking. Ms Pascoe: Yes. Senator CANAVAN: Which organisation did that involve? Ms Pascoe: Sure. I will just get that. Mr Baird: I might be able to assist with that. Yipirinya School Council gave a number of enforceable undertakings. Senator CANAVAN: And one got a direction? Mr Baird: That was the New Connection Church of the ACT. Senator CANAVAN: And there were two warnings, I think? Mr Baird: They were to the Islamic Society of Belconnen—and, in due course, the New Connection Church was also the subject of a warning. Senator CANAVAN: Are you able to provide broad reasons for those warnings and enforceable undertakings? Mr Baird: We publish an annual compliance report. Whilst we are unable to publish the reasons for each of those actions, we do publish examples of the way we deal with certain situations, but they are anonymous. They do give the public an indication of our approach to these matters. Senator CANAVAN: I am a little surprised. Why should that information be confidential? Do you have some reason for that? These are concluded investigations; they are not ongoing. Mr Baird: Yes. That is as a result of the secrecy provisions of our act. Senator CANAVAN: Of the tax act or the charities act? Mr Leeper: Following the announcement by government of the decision to open an office in 2017, we did a scan of the local market. We are looking for approximately 7,500 square metres of office space to house 600 staff, consistent with the current accommodation guidelines operated across government. No such site existed. So, completely consistent with other places where we have made arrangements with the marketplace to lease accommodation—like Adelaide, Docklands, Dandenong, Box Hill and Albury—we ran an expression of interest process indicating that we were seeking a certain grade of office accommodation to a certain size by a certain period and without regard to location, except that it is in a bounded part of the Gosford CBD. I have a map I can table if the committee is interested. But we did not specify location. We said, 'We're in the market for an office to support 600 staff, which we need constructed and able to be fitted out by the middle of 2017 for occupancy later in the year.' Senator O'NEILL: Could you take on notice the types of jobs that you expect those 600 staff to be filling in that. I do not want to use the time today to go through that in detail. Mr Leeper: Very briefly, it will be broadly representative of other offices that we have. Senator O'NEILL: I am assuming that, in that period of time, you were given directions by the Assistant Treasurer. Is that correct? Senator Cormann: That is an appropriate question to ask—whether there was a direction. Mr Leeper: I am not sure that we are subject to direction, in that sense. Senator Cormann: I would be very surprised if there was, but we can take on notice whether there was. Senator O'NEILL: Any communications between you and the Assistant Treasurer in the period between 25 and 28 October. Senator Cormann: You are talking about 2015, are you? Senator O'NEILL: Yes, last year. Senator Cormann: We will take that on notice and we will check that for you. Senator O'NEILL: Just to see if she indicated the community concern. I am referring to a document tabled in the Senate from the ATO which states: 'The review and approval process has been completed and approval from the Minister for Finance has been received for the ATO proposal.' Could you explain to me the link between the finance minister and the Assistant Treasurer in this instance? Mr Leeper: That is part of the normal process. We go through the evaluation, we reach a conclusion about the best-value-for-money option from the field of applicants. The commission assigns an undertaking or a covering note to the secretary of the Department of Finance indicating that this has been the outcome of the tender process and the secretary of Finance, as I understand it, then needs to seek ministerial approval. I would emphasise that these are the normal, ordinary processes followed for these kinds of leases. Senator O'NEILL: Could I have a copy of those normal, ordinary documents and the dates on which this happened? I think it was estimated in 2002 they were around 24 per cent. Is it now around five per cent in terms of the actual— Mr Hirschhorn: In terms of the effective tax rate of the PRRT? Senator WHISH-WILSON: Yes. Mr Hirschhorn: It is 40. Senator WHISH-WILSON: Forty per cent is what it is set at, but after deductions, in line with the growth of value in tax, tax collection has not really improved much since it started. As I was saying earlier, gas production has ramped up quite significantly. I cannot imagine that is all due to falls in prices. Mr Heferen: You also have to think that with the way the PRRT is designed—and I must confess I am certainly no expert in it—the PRRT, being a rent tax, is aimed at taxing the cash flow. So rather than income tax, which looks at the tax paid at the normal and the above-normal return to capital, the PRRT just tries to tax the above-normal by having a cash flow tax. The big difference is the expenditure. The idea is that money comes in, money goes out, minus one off the other and pay 40 per cent of the difference. The difference between the PRRT and a genuine cash flow tax is that a genuine cash flow tax, where it is a negative, would have that refunded. The PRRT simply uplifts it and carries it forward. So, in a situation where there is a very large project and there is a lot of expenditure on both exploration and developing, there will be a lot of losses that are then carried forward. And they are uplifted, I think, at eight per cent. I think the exploration might be uplifted at 15 but the normal— Senator WHISH-WILSON: A rate of the bond rate plus 15 per cent— Mr Heferen: Sorry, yes, the bond rate plus. I beg your pardon. So, where there is a project that has had significant capital works over it over a number of years, you would expect those losses to be carried forward, to be uplifted, and— Senator WHISH-WILSON: Do you know when those rates were set and what the rationale was for setting them? Mr Heferen: I would have to take that on notice. I assume they were part of the original design of the PRRT. Senator WHISH-WILSON: I could not find out if they were or not, so that is genuine. Mr Olesen: As you know, Senator, the instant asset write-off increased to \$20,000 in the budget last year. Tax returns for that year are progressively coming in. We have quite possibly got about half of the tax returns in from businesses at this stage for the 2014-15 year. Senator McALLISTER: That is quite a big number, isn't it? Mr Olesen: What we have done is to look at that and compare that with the kinds of claims—sorry, I should just go back a step. In the tax return, there is a single number of people who claim the instant asset write-off, so there is limited information that we can see from the tax return that allows us to analyse, in any kind of depth, what is happening there. When we compare that with the full-year picture that emerged back in 2012-13, when there was a \$6,500 write-off, the numbers look kind of comparable. There is nothing in the macro picture—that is what I am trying to say—that gives us any cause for concern. I should also say that anecdotally, in the feedback we are getting from the industry bodies and others that we deal with, we have not come upon anything that has given us undue concern about claims that are being made. Senator McALLISTER: Can I just clarify something before you go on: when you talk about the macro picture and the total volume of tax returns accessing that particular provision being comparable, do you mean that it is the same as last time as a proportion of returns, or do you mean it is what would be expected given the change in the measure? Mr Olesen: I think, both. My Treasury colleagues might like to comment on how the estimate is going but when we compare it with prior years where there was a significant write-off available of \$6,500, the numbers look kind of comparable at a macro level. Senator McALLISTER: The same numbers? Mr Olesen: Yes, in terms of the numbers of people. That is right. To give us a little bit more granularity about what is going on we are now going through a process of running a range of risk filters over the data we have that are highlighting, for us, cases that might warrant some closure attention. As I said, we just have the one number on the tax return, which allows us to do some analysis comparing it with some other labels and prior years—those kinds of things. We now have selected a pool of cases and we are about to go out and start to have a closer look at the nature of claims that have been made in those cases. That work is just about to commence. We are looking to do small tens in the initial round of cases. Subject to what we find in that initial round of cases we might do some subsequent ones. That will then give us the next level of detail about what is happening out there in respect of this measure. CHAIR: Can you just clarify: is that an increase from 2013-14? Mr Olesen: Sorry, I do not have the numbers in front of me. From 2012-13, the numbers at this stage are looking—there is awful lot of projection in this because we are only about half-way through the lodgement period—similar in terms of the number of claims. I do not have the number in my head for 2013-14. CHAIR: But it is not such a number that it is— Mr Olesen: There is nothing in the macro picture that is causing us alarm about the way in which this is going. Senator McALLISTER: Given your experience with the program in its other guises, what are the most common types of fraud that you would expect to see in this audit process that you are commencing? CHAIR: That calls for a speculation. Senator McALLISTER: What were the most common problems in the past with schemes of this kind in terms of tactics undertaken? CHAIR: Was there any fraud committed in the past and give me some examples of what they were. Senator McALLISTER: Thank you, Senator Edwards. Is it your view that there was a group of individuals who Project Wickenby identified, and the problem has been resolved, or is it an ongoing challenge? Mr Jordan: There is always an ongoing challenge, because people sometimes go to great lengths to conceal assets and income. I think as a general proposition it is less of an overall risk now than it would have been 10 or so years ago, because the world has become a lot smaller. With the exchange of information, with secrecy in Switzerland being opened up now under our treaties, and with all of those 100 countries that we have information exchange agreements with, it is very difficult to be able to hide your money. Also, you cannot trust anyone any more, because people leak things—you saw the 'Luxleaks' of disaffected employees, some of the Swiss banks with disaffected employees, and you see the US paying for discs of information. One famous case I think involved an employee of one of the Swiss banks in Lichtenstein who provided a lot of information, and there was quite a bit of money raised by the US and others. Those countries, the UK and the US, tend to share that with us. We had a situation of a Singapore trustee company where the IT consultant came in to update their systems and they downloaded everything there and sold it to a country. So you really cannot trust anyone any more. When you get these trustee companies and lawyers saying, 'Come to me. Your secrets will be our secrets. No-one will ever find out about this.' Well, take that with a grain of salt now, because money often speaks. There are a number of these examples in which we really say that you cannot trust anyone and the world is a small place. On residency, often it is not trying to play with whether or not you are a resident of Australia. Often you are clearly a resident but you are just hiding money and trying to pretend that companies are controlled by someone else. A famous one of these recently was the Samoan bank case where the court held, and I think the full Federal Court has now held in that case, that clearly those companies were controlled by people here in Australia—the nominee Swiss director who gave all the money to the families and all these other things and did not really do that by their own motivations. That is the sort of thing that Wickenby really exposed—people here with highly artificial, highly contrived structures that pretended that the real control sat with someone else, so they were not assessed on their— Senator DASTYARI: From what you are saying, it sounds like there are parallels in the tactics that may be used by individuals and the tactics that are used by multinationals that you are concerned about, noting that most Australian taxpayers pay their tax? Mr Jordan: Some of the multinationals are probably more on the legal side of things and they are arguing finer points around the law. The other stuff is just evasion and fraud—straight up and down fraud. So it is probably in a lot worse category of activity in that individual's case. There are a few accountants and firms that do promote these things. Obviously we look at them and we look at all their clients. In one small accounting firm there was about \$350 million in tax through the schemes that that firm ran. Senator DASTYARI: You provided information for Q1 and Q2. Mr Heferen: We have certainly looked at the Deloitte model. Senator KETTER: Under those models—and you may not be able to answer this question at this point—how many Australians would pay more tax on their super under these scenarios? Mr Heferen: Under the Deloitte model? Senator KETTER: The marginal tax rate minus, say, the 15 per cent. Mr Heferen: A lot would depend on what that rebate was. I think with the Deloitte one, before I get myself into trouble, I better take it on notice. Otherwise, I could potentially mislead. I must confess, I know the work has been done, but I cannot recall specifically what their rebate amount is. Then, of course, the other tricky thing in this is that would be compared to the current marginal rates system. Absent any other change, a lot of people would be worse off—if you take not having a high rate of tax applied to your super as being worse off, if there was no other change. But I would have to go back and check the work that Deloitte did, but I am sure that they would be arguing, 'Make this change and don't do any other.' That would seem to be a little self-defeating. The task force has reported levels of non-insurance lower than what we believe is the case in North Queensland, in a relative sense, but in terms of underinsurance they come to a view that it is hard to identify levels of underinsurance. The general view in the community is that we are terribly underinsured or terribly non-insured. The task force interim report does not support that view. So my question to Treasury is: what have you done to come to your own view about the level of insurance in North Queensland, if anything? Ms Quinn: As you know, data is data. The data you are referring to, on table 2 on page 17 of the interim report, is the official Australian Bureau of Statistics data looking at the share of owner-occupied households with no weekly expenditure on insurance. The evaluation of that, as you said, is that Northern Queensland has 8.1 per cent with no weekly expenditure, compared to other regions like New South Wales, where it is 14.6 per cent. That is a subset of total households. It is owner-occupied households, as opposed to renters and all the rest. So that piece of data does suggest that Northern Queensland is slightly below the national average in people who do not have insurance, which is counter to the idea that there is significant underinsurance. Senator McLUCAS: But you would agree that that is the view in North Queensland—that we have this level of underinsurance and non-insurance? So have you tested those figures from Treasury's perspective? Ms Quinn: I am happy to look into it a little bit more. I am personally not sure about the additional work done around this, except I do know that the task force rigorously interrogated all different data sources as part of their investigations. Senator McLUCAS: I suppose I am using Treasury as a test of the data from the task force, which is probably a bit rude. Ms Quinn: I have full confidence in the members of the task force, who reached out to other parts of the Public Service and parts of the private sector to verify the data. So I have no reason to doubt the veracity of the ABS information or the processes, but I am happy to take any extra information on notice. Senator McLUCAS: I am not asking Treasury to undertake a large piece of work. You have probably answered the question by saying data is data. Have there been any consumer surveys done to look at what consumers actually expect? Mr Sims: Mr Gregson is probably best placed to give you the answer to that. Mr Gregson: We have not undertaken surveys. I am happy to elaborate on how we form our views. Senator CANAVAN: If you could. Mr Gregson: The courts do not generally require, nor do they place, generally speaking, much weight on consumer surveys in answering the question of what a reasonable person would think. That is the test under our legislation. In this matter, we have had regard to what we think is the common sense approach—the common view on free-range, meaning chickens having access and actually going outside. We have been assisted, though, by the representations that industry make in their promotional material, which clearly shows that they understand that consumers believe that chickens go outside when free-range. We have also noted a number of other surveys dating back a few years. They all ask slightly different questions and come up with slightly different answers, perhaps revealing some of the challenges with consumer surveys. Senator CANAVAN: On notice, would you mind providing the details of those surveys—the ones you looked at a few years ago? Mr Gregson: Certainly. Senator CANAVAN: Sorry, Mr Sims, did you want to add something? Mr Sims: Obviously, a lot of times companies advertise their chooks as being outside, so they are very much giving the impression to consumers from the packaging that the chooks are outside. Senator CANAVAN: Although, of course, the test that you seem to be applying is 'most chickens on most days', which may not be quite the same as having some chickens pitch it outside. I recognise that this is the case law and provisions and that jurisprudence. My understanding is that the government or COAG is undertaking some kind of process now to try to develop a standard. Mr Sims: Yes. The consumer affairs minister— Senator CANAVAN: Yes. Do you have any input into that? Mr Sims: Yes, we have input. The policy advising department is the Treasury, but they ask us for views, like I am sure they ask many people for views. I do not necessarily want a direct answer now, but is that something that the ACCC has looked at? I would imagine that there are obviously some legitimate benefits to be obtained from buying goods in bulk. There is a direct, reasonable, commensurate discount which is causally related to the volume that you are purchasing. How do you distinguish between that and a discount that appears to be a function, or almost an abuse, of market power which means that the smaller retailers get squeezed out of the marketplace because some suppliers say, 'We can't afford say no to these people at the price that they want'? It is not a very eloquent question. Mr Sims: No, I understand, Senator. It gets back to what we often find, and that can just be the use of market power. If you are a big player, you do get things cheaper. If you go into those large shopping centres, the Coles and Woolworths and the big supermarkets have the cheapest rent, and, by definition, to make the project work, the other players pay more rent. It is not against the law. Senator XENOPHON: This goes beyond that, though. This is not about retail tenancies— Mr Sims: Sure. I understand, but it is the same point. If you are making biscuits and you have to really sell to a major outlet, then, if they have a stronger bargaining position, they can get a price from you, and you may have to charge others more. And even if they may have considerable resources, their lawyers tell them the cost of going to court could be in the many hundreds of thousands or millions of dollars, so there is a very live issue of access to justice and something that the ACCC is painfully aware of when you bring a case and it does not succeed. Could you on notice provide me with what thoughts, considerations, submissions and plans the ACCC may have to improve that access to justice? We may have laws that may be robust, but their enforcement is not because of the issue of costs. Ms Sims: You are right, we will take that on notice. We then found that, three weeks later, APRA approved Wide Bay for a banking licence, allowing it to become Auswide Bank from 1 April. Do you work with ASIC on issues relating to financial advice and the links between financial institutions? Mr Byres: As a general point, there is a high degree of coordination between APRA and ASIC, including information sharing of matters where ASIC and APRA might have an interest in a particular regulated institution. I am not familiar with the facts of that specific case, but it is not clear to me what—effectively, all Wide Bay did was change its status. It was an ADI, an authorised deposit taker, under the act. After the event, it is an authorised deposit taker under the Banking Act. It was simply a question of whether they met the criteria to use the word 'bank' in their business name, and they do, so it is a fairly automatic process—if you meet the criteria, you can use the word 'bank'. The fact that there may be issues that ASIC had identified that required rectification would not in and of itself be, in any way, a reason to stop that process proceeding. It was an application process that probably would have been in train for a little while. I am quite confident that the relevant agencies, and more to the point the relevant staff within the two agencies, were aware of the respective issues. Senator XENOPHON: And the court found that FOS were only bound by the terms of reference and that these formed the entire contract between the disputed parties and the FOS, and that their operational guidelines merely assisted in understanding the terms of reference. Is that a fair summary? Mr Kell: In brief, yes. Senator XENOPHON: You can elaborate on notice if you want. I am just conscious of time. CHAIR: You are not under pressure here. My understanding is that the court would not disturb a FOS decision unless there is evidence of bad faith, bias or the decision was so unreasonable that no reasonable decision maker could have arrived at that decision—that is, the unreasonableness test. Is that your understanding? Mr Kell: Again, in short, yes. Senator XENOPHON: I am not taking issue with the court's decision. The now clarified situation that emerges from the findings does concern me. FOS, like, say, the AAT, is supposed to act as a buffer in terms of likely expensive litigation. I suggest that if it is a financial institution, they will clearly have an advantage over the applicant or the complainant because of the financial resources disparity between the two. I wonder whether ASIC has considered whether there ought to be a more administrative law dispute resolution flavour in FOS: that is, issues of procedural fairness, having all the cards laid face-up on the table, and with strong rights in relation to this and rules as to proper and improper considerations—in other words, the sort of rigour that we see with the Administrative Appeals Tribunal, rather than the more narrow confines that FOS seems to be within, which seem to be based on contractual terms of reference. Again, I am not criticising FOS, I am just saying that I wonder, as a result of Goldie's case, whether ASIC is looking at perhaps encouraging or being part of a reform of FOS—again, I am not criticising the good people of FOS—to get rid of the constraints as set out by the Victorian Supreme Court in the Goldie case. Mr Kell: I do not think we would be of the view that Goldie's case itself generates that need, but it is the broader issue of how FOS goes about hearing disputes and what sorts of processes it has—the evidentiary processes it has. That has been an issue pretty much from day one around these schemes, because there is a tension between their role as faster, quicker, cheaper alternative dispute resolution venues and having more complicated but arguably more court-like processes, and that tension remains. Our focus is very much on: are we seeing the quality of decision making overall at a level that is high and satisfactory and that enables the scheme to deal with the vast majority of retail complaints that come before it in an efficient way? To enable it to do that and to remain cost-effective and quick, there are inevitably aspects of the way that the courts work—or even that the AAT works—that, if you introduced them in FOS, would undermine that other objective.
