#### Question

#### SWA - Increase in deaths in construction

Senator LINES: With the increase in deaths in construction, do any particular states stand out or has there been a general increase of tragic deaths? Is there a way to explain that? Ms Baxter: We do not have that information with us. I can take that on notice to see if we can get you that information.

#### **Answer**

Table 1 shows the number of worker fatalities in the construction industry from 2003 to 2014\* by state/territory where the incident occurred. Based on these statistics no particular state or territory stands out for the years 2003 to 2013. The available statistical information does not provide an explanation about the causes underlying the year to year variation in fatality numbers.

Fatality numbers do not take into account the number of workers employed in construction. Therefore, caution needs to be exercised in comparing fatality numbers between years.

Taking into account the number of people employed in the industry, fatality rates (the number of fatalities per 100,000 workers) indicate that fatalities in construction have been declining since 2011 across Australia.
