Question

Child Care Rebate

1a. What modelling has the department undertaken to determine the impact on families of the freezing of the Child Care Rebate cap? b. How many families and how many children will be impacted by the freezing of the cap? c. Was this information provided to government prior to the decision being made? 2. How many families choose to get their Child Care Rebate paid fortnightly, monthly & yearly and how does this compare to previous years? 3. How many families choose to have their Child Care Rebate paid directly to their service provider? How does this compare to previous years?

Answer

- 1a. The department has not modelled the effect of the 2013-14 Child Care Rebate Budget measure on individual families as the impact will depend on their individual circumstances, taking into account family income, type of care, hours of care used and number of children in care.
- 1b. It is estimated that 74,400 families and 109,000 children will be affected by this measure in 2014-15.
- 1c. The department does not comment on advice to Government.
- 2. & 3. As indicated in the table below, the number of families choosing the Child Care Rebate fortnightly payment option direct to their service has increased over the last three financial years.
