Year 12 applications

Question

The department has released figures detailing offers and applications made for academic year 2015. This (p.4) tells us that, overall and excluding WA, there was a decrease in applications through TACs of 0.2% - can you confirm that?

And can you confirm that, excluding WA, Year 12 applications – either through TACs or not through TACs - increased by 1.3%; and non-Year 12 applications fell by 1.9%? Does that small increase reflect population trends for that age group, or does it exceed population growth?

Most notably, applications by non-Year 12 applicants fell significantly – didn't they? For example, in NSW they fell by 6%. In WA they fell by over 14%. Can you confirm that? These trends were offset by growth in applications where participation has historically been very low – such as Tasmania and the NT. That's true, isn't it?

Offers were down 1.0% on last year. Can you confirm that?

And offers to non-Year 12 applicants fell by 3.0% nationally, excluding WA, didn't they? Offers to Year 12 applicants grew by just 0.6% nationally (excluding WA), didn't they? Does the Government still contend that, in a system with enrolment caps removed, growth in places offered will be uncontrollable? Aren't they stabilising?

Answer

- Yes, but when you take account of applications processed directly through universities there was an increase of 1.0% in the academic year 2015.
- No. As at February 2015, Year 12 applications processed through TACs and directly through universities have increased by 1.9 per cent and non-year 12 applications have increased by 0.4 per cent.
- No. The number of 17-18 year-olds, the feeder group for Year 12 applications, decreased by 0.2 per cent between June 2013 and June 2014.
- Direct applications have increased by 6.8 per cent. More than 96 per cent of direct applications are made by non-Year 12 applicants.
- No. In 2015, offers (both through TACs and direct) increased by 0.9 per cent on 2014 and in 2014 the increase was 2.0 per cent on 2013, indicating offers are stabilising.
