## Question

Student support - Victorian regional universities

Can you please indicate how many students undertook training at a university in regional Victoria in 2013, and what percentage of the total number of university students this is? Can you please indicate how many students living in regional Victoria have an outstanding HECS debt? For each of the above mentioned requests, can you please provide a comparison of Victoria's student numbers to the other states?

#### **Answer**

The table below shows the number of students, domestic and international, enrolled at regional campuses in 2012 for each state and territory. Verified data for 2013 calendar year does not become available until mid-2014. 2012 data is provided. It also shows those students as a proportion of all students studying in Australia. Campuses have been classified as regional based on the Australian Statistical Geography Standard.
