## **Question:**

Senator SIEWERT: I might put on notice: how assured are you with their assurances and what, in concrete, do you have which shows that they are meeting those requirements beyond their assurances to the Commonwealth?

Mr Stacey: We will take that on notice.

#### **Answer:**

Reforms to Property and Tenancy Management (PTM) under the National Partnership Agreement on Remote Indigenous Housing in the Northern Territory (NT) include improvements in tenants' understanding of their rights and responsibilities.

The NT Department of Housing advises that prior to the commencement of a Tenancy Agreement, the tenants are provided with Intensive Tenancy Support to ensure that they understand their rights and responsibilities.

The Commonwealth monitors these mechanisms in a number of ways.

- Regular Reporting The NT Government is required to report monthly on
  progress against the PTM reform milestones. This monthly update to the
  Commonwealth includes the number of Tenancy Agreements that have been put
  in place. Tenancy Agreements can only be put in place where houses meet the
  Residential Tenancies Act standard.
- Annual Reporting The NT Government is required to provide an Annual Status Report to the Commonwealth at the end of each financial year. This report allows for comparison across the jurisdictions.
- Regular Joint Steering Committee (JSC) meetings the NT Government reports on progress against the PTM reforms through the regular JSC meetings held between executive officers from both governments. The JSC also provides an opportunity to discuss and resolve any issues that may arise.

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• *Joint Management arrangements* - The existing Joint Management arrangement also provides oversight for the Commonwealth on progress of PTM reforms, through an embedded team within the NT Department of Housing.
