
Is it correct for the author of the brochure to assert at the bottom of page 3 of the brochure that 'this page totally copied from an excellent infographic

a) The PEO website indicates that all material is made available for use under the Creative Commons Attribution-Non-Commercial-No Derivs 3.0 Australia licence. That regime provides for the use of material to be referenced and places other requirements on derivative use. Mr Alexander has described the distribution of preferences and has provided the numerical example accurately using the PEO Fact sheet. The post on his blog was 30 months ago, does not appear to have recently attracted on-line commentary and contains a broken link. The department, after considering whether to engage with Mr Alexander, exercised the judgement not to do so, given the age of the post, the broken link to the PEO website and the potential for any reaction by the PEO or the department to be misinterpreted as censorship.
