1. PURPOSE AND CONTEXT

When people work together in an Organisation like the Central Land Council (CLC), it really helps if you are clear about the behaviour expected from you. Most of us would agree that treating one another fairly and with respect, is a good approach. This Code of Conduct simply states such basic and common principles, so that everyone knows fully what is expected of them.

This Code of Conduct applies to all CLC employees, including the Director and the Chairman.

2. HIGH STANDARDS OF PERSONAL & PROFESSIONAL BEHAVIOUR

As a CLC Employee you must:

First and foremost, pursue the best interests of the Aboriginal people of Central Australia;

- I. Maintain and enhance the good reputation of the CLC by keeping the highest ethical standards while carrying out your work;
- II. Dedicate your working time and energy to furthering CLC's gains for Aboriginal people;
- III. Behave honestly, and with integrity at all times;
- IV. Treat everyone gently, and with respect. Be sensitive to peoples' rights and do not harass anyone;
- V. Perform your work with skill and dedication, to the best that you can;
- VI. Use your highest technical or professional judgement in making decisions;
- VII. Keep further developing your skills and knowledge in your professional field;
- VIII. Perform your work taking into account all relevant Acts, Award, Certified Agreement and organisational or sectional guidelines;
- IX. Role model the above high standards of behaviour, to encourage other employees to practise them too;

X. Managers and supervisors are expected to thoroughly deal with cases of misconduct.

3. USE OF CLC RESOURCES

Do not use your positions power or authority to gain a benefit for yourself personally, or for another person, group/body (unless they are clients);

- I. Always spend CLC money wisely and carefully, and avoid wasting or using CLC's resources carelessly;
- II. You shall not use the skills or working time of other employees for your personal benefit, gain or recreation;
- III. You shall not use the resources or equipment of CLC for your personal benefit, gain or recreation

4. PRINCIPLES OF EQUITY

I. In either managing programs, or in making decisions concerning individual matters, you must include a process that is seen to be fair and which promotes equity.

5. DUTY OF CARE

- I. As a CLC employee you must take care to ensure the accuracy, efficiency and objectivity in the information and advice you give to others;
- II. You should avoid unnecessary delay in making decisions or taking action.

6. DISCLOSURE OF WRONG DOING

I. Employees have a duty to report to a supervisor, manager, Director, Chairman, Executive, or Council, any unethical behaviour, corrupt act or wrong doing by any other member of employee or Council

7. FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH REQUIREMENTS

If you have breached the Code of Conduct, the CLC may decide to take disciplinary action against you. Sanctions may be applied for involvement in:

- I. unacceptable behaviour in the course of your duties;
- II. unauthorised leave of absence;
- III. unsatisfactory performance of duties; and
- IV. breaches of the Code of Conduct.

The sanction(s) to be applied will depend on how serious and/or repeated, breaches are considered to be. These may include:

- I. counselling by a supervisor or, in extreme cases, by the Director;
- II. a record of behaviour being documented and placed on personnel file;
- III. deferment or non-payment of salary increment;
- IV. not being recommended for a further term of employment;
- V. cancellation of contract where person is a consultant to the CLC;
- VI. and/or dismissal.

8. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

I. As an employee of the CLC you must ensure that you are and are seen to be fair and equitable in your dealings with other employees, outside agencies, Aboriginal clients and the public. A conflict of interest occurs when your personal, financial or other interests conflict with the fair and impartial performance of your official duties

9. PUBLIC COMMENT ON OFFICIAL MATTERS

- II. As a member of the community you have a right, and there is little restriction on you, to make public comment. However, you should make the capacity in which you are commenting, ie. as a private citizen, clear to your audience.
- III. Employees attending the meetings of other agencies must announce who they are representing at the start of that meeting. In this way, comment can be correctly understood to be either personal opinion or official comment, as appropriate.
- IV. The confidentiality clause in your employment contract prohibits you from making any unauthorised disclosure of CLC information. If you have any doubts you should seek approval for what you want to say.
- V. There may also be circumstances where it would be inappropriate for you to make public comment even in a private capacity, for example where:

- a. it could appear that you are commenting as a CLC employee;b. you are directly involved in the management of a specific policy or program;c. your comments are a severe criticism of a CLC employee, policy or procedure.
