Senator GALLAGHER: In terms of staff turnover in the department, what is your separation rate?

Ms Croke: The overall separation rate at 25 March 2015 was 13.9 per cent.

Senator GALLAGHER: That seems high. This is probably a question for the Public Service Commissioner. Is that higher than the average in the APS?

Ms Croke: I am honestly not sure.

Answer

The Australian Public Service Commission's *State of the Service Report 2013-14 (p175)* recorded an ongoing employee separation rate of 7.6%.

At 25 March 2015, the DPS ongoing employee separation was 8.1%, which is 0.5% higher than the 2013-14 APS ongoing employee separation rate.

At 25 March 2015, the DPS total employee separation rate was 13.9%. The total employee separation rate is inclusive of all ongoing and non-ongoing employees. The APSC does not record a total employee separation rate in the *State of the Service Report*.
