Since Budget Estimates in June, 2014, The ILC has had 3.4 FTE staff reductions since Budget Estimates in June 2014; one voluntary redundancy, two reductions through natural attrition and a position reduced to 0.6 of an FTE. All reductions were a result of restructures and redistribution of responsibilities.

- 2. The ILC has not had any reductions due to involuntary redundancies.
- 3. The ILC does plan to reduce its administrative costs by 5% over the next 4years. This reduction will be achieved by combination of cost efficiency measures and staff reductions through natural attrition. Core ILC services/programs will continue notwithstanding the proposed reduction in administrative costs.
- 4. Staff reductions through natural attrition have been identified as a mechanism to assist in achieving the proposed cost reduction over the next 4 years.
