The remaining 13 code of conduct investigations (not including preliminary investigations) were investigated internally.

- 4. One case was referred to the Federal Court. Four cases were reviewed by the Fair Work Commission.
- 5. Of the 22 external investigations, 14 investigations found the employee had breached the Code of Conduct. Additionally, four investigations found the employee did not have a case to answer, one investigation was discontinued and three employees resigned prior to the completion of the investigation.
