At least at the time that I sent this information, obviously based on a good faith summary of what my officers had provided to me—this attachment is dated November—the department notes that no such evidence had been advanced during the course of the inquiry. We did add the point, given the role and standing of the commission, that it was in fact irresponsible to advance such claims without first having sought to have their veracity investigated. They are pretty direct words for one statutory officer to provide to another. I do concede that.
