Program: 1.4 Justice Services

Question No. AE17/094

Senator Pratt asked the following question at the hearing on 28 February 2017:

- 1. Of the 12 specialist domestic violence units announced in October 2015 as part of the Women's Safety Package:
- a) How many have been launched?
- b) How many are currently operational?
- c) How were the locations determined?
- d) Who was consulted on the locations?
- e) How are they being monitored?
- 2. What evaluation has been undertaken to ascertain whether the establishment of 12 specialist domestic violence units has improved access to justice and support for domestic violence victims?
- 3. Of the \$15 million in funding announced in October 2015 for establishing specialised domestic violence units:
- a) How much funding will be spent on each separate specialist domestic violence unit?
- b) How much of this funding has been spent so far?
- 4. Is the Department considering establishing specialist domestic violence units in addition to the 12 that have already been announced?

The answer to the honourable senator's question is as follows:

- 1.
- a) Twelve new specialist domestic violence units have been established by legal assistance providers at pilot locations in each state and territory. Five health justice partnerships are being supported to deliver legal training and support for health professionals and to provide on-site legal advice at partner hospitals or health centres.
- b) The twelve specialist domestic violence units and the five health justice partnerships are all currently operational.
- c) Independent data sources, such as crime statistics and demographic data, were used to help inform suitable locations to pilot these services. The services are located in areas with high reported rates of domestic violence and there is at least one specialist domestic violence unit in each state and territory. The locations cover a mix of urban, regional and remote areas and locations with Indigenous or culturally diverse communities.
- d) Within the time available, the locations were recommended to Government based on independent data sources as set out in c) above. Once the locations had been determined, state and territory governments were consulted on appropriate service providers.
- e) The services are being monitored through regular progress, financial and data reports. The department and service providers agreed on a list of data items to be collected. This data set includes client demographic information and details of the legal and non-legal services delivered. The department is planning a national evaluation of the pilot services to establish an evidence

base and inform future Government decisions. Service providers have been given the opportunity to provide feedback on the evaluation framework before it is settled.

2. The department has drafted an evaluation plan with the support of external consultants. The department is consulting with providers on the draft evaluation plan before finalising.

3.

a) The funding allocation over four years for each specialist domestic violence unit is set out below. This table does not include the additional \$3.4 million provided in the 2017-18 Budget to expand the pilot program for specialist domestic violence units, which has not yet been allocated.

^{4.} This is a matter for the Australian Government. As part of the 2017-18 Budget, the Attorney-General announced that \$3.4 million over two years has been allocated to expand the pilot program for specialist domestic violence units. Of the additional funding, \$1.2 million will be distributed in 2017-18 for part-year operation and \$2.2 million in 2018-19 for 12-month operating costs.
