Senator SESELJA: Has the trend in the last year and a half been for it to take a longer or shorter time to process 457 applications?

Mr Vardos: I understand that the processing time has blown out a little bit. I cannot give you the exact figure but I understand that it has regressed in the comparable period 12 months before that.

Senator SESELJA: Perhaps on notice you could give us those numbers.

The announcement in February 2013 of reforms to the 457 programme and an increase to visa application costs led to an increase in subclass 457 visa applications in June 2013. As a result of this surge, processing times increased significantly and peaked at 63 days in September 2013.

There has been an improving trend since that time.
