The Ministerial Advisory Council on Skilled Migration was consulted and provided input in respect of changes to the 457 programme.

The reforms were developed following a number of consultative processes, including the "Independent Review into Integrity in the Subclass 457 Programme" (the Azarias Review) in 2014, which met with over 150 stakeholders and received 189 written submissions.

The Department is aware that the Minister's office consulted a range of stakeholders in development of the recently announced reforms to the subclass 457 programme. This includes consultation with representatives from the tourism, hospitality, manufacturing, business and other sectors. The Department does not have a list of these stakeholder meetings.
