## Senator Waters asked:

1. When the Department briefed the Minister on the Waratah Coal's China First project approval (EPBC 2009/4737) did that briefing advise the Minister with regard to:

a) the Queensland Department of Environment and Heritage Protection's Environmental Protection Order (EPO) issued against Waratah Coal in relation to the drilling exploration holes at the Galilee site; and

b) Mr Palmer's other company, Queensland Nickel Pty Ltd's history of dumping toxic waste on the Reef without permission on two occasions?

2. Did the Department advise the Minister to approve the mine while it had an outstanding EPO against it and when Mr Palmer had become known for his disregard for environmental protections?

3. What criteria does the Department use to assess whether a proponent is a fit and proper person to hold an EPBC approval?

4. Has there been any structured review of the criteria for assessing whether a proponent is a fit and proper person?

5. Have these criteria changed since the 2013 election?

6. Does the Department still believe that Mr Palmer or companies he controls are fit and proper persons to hold an EPBC approval?
