Final Applications and Offers for Tasmania

The final applications and offers for Tasmania over the period, 1999 to 2003 is set out below in Table 1. It should be noted that the data provided here refer only to applications received by the admission centres and offers made through the centres and do not include direct applications to institutions or offers made by institutions.

However the raw applications and offers data is not necessarily an accurate indicator of unmet demand. In order to gain a more realistic indication of 'unmet demand' for higher education the AVCC applies a discounting methodology to account for:

- Double counting of people applying to more than one state admission centre;
- Successful applicants who have rejected an offer of a place; and
- Less qualified applicants who may have been unrealistic in their choices.

The total number of unsuccessful eligible applicants, after discounting, is set out below in Table 2.
