Question 11

Outcome 1 (Compensation and Resources) **Topic: DFISA**

Senator Mark Bishop asked:

- (a) Were costings done on the administrative costs of alternative models for the exemption of disability pensions from the SSA means test, and if so what were the costings for each model.
- (b) What is the precise break up of the 19 000 beneficiaries of DFISA by SSA payment type, and VEA payment type.
- (c) What are the projected levels of allowance by disability pension levels for each Centrelink benefit, including tax as currently provided in the Bill, and according to the proposed amendments assuming assessable income at the lowest marginal rate.

Answer:

- (c) The amount of DFISA a person receives will depend on many factors, including the amount of disability pension they receive, the type of social security pension or benefit they receive, their marital status, any amount of other income they receive and whether they are a home–owner or renting privately.

As at 22 October there were 21019 DFISA recipients, with an average DFISA rate of \$44.23 across the entire population.

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Following is a list of DFISA recipients by social security payment type. This list gives the number of people receiving DFISA in each category and the average payment as at 22 October 2004.

Where the social security payment is non-taxable the DFISA payment is non-taxable.

Some payments may be either taxable or non-taxable depending on circumstances, such as the age of the recipient. These are identified in the above table. All other payments listed in the table are taxable payments.

The net indicative fortnightly benefits from DFISA based on the current rates for single disability support pensioners with no other income and not renting is as follows, based on rates as at 20 September 2004:

Due to the complex interplay of a number of variables, it is not possible for DVA to determine the impact on an individual's income tax situation. However, the majority of DFISA recipients are over pension age and will therefore receive the senior Australians' tax offset (SATO). Where this applies the individual will pay minimal, if any, additional tax. Nobody will be financially worse off as a result of receiving the payment.

- (a) What was the final cost of the film "Australians at War"?
- (b) When were tenders called, and when did they close.
- (c) How many expressions of interest were received, and how many were short listed.
- (d) What payments were made to those short listed.
- (e) What was the name of each company short listed, and what was the tender price offered by each for their proposal.
- (f) What were the selection criteria for assessing the most suitable proposal.
- (g) Who was on the assessment panel, who chaired it, what was the process of appointment, and who made the final appointment decision.
- (h) In what order were the applicants eliminated, and when was each advised.
- (i) Who were the nominated historians for each proposal in the original bid, and who were the historians finally used by the successful bidder.
- (j) Prior to the contract being let how many interviews and conversations were conducted by members of the assessment team with the principals of each proposal.
- (k) Were records of those interviews and conversations recorded.
- (1) Who was awarded the contract, and what sum was paid in total.
- (m) What was the name of each company sub contracted by the successful company, and in each case was approval required and given.

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- (n) What extensions and variations were made to the original contract and what was the reason and cost of each.
- (0) What form of acquittal process was conducted before final payment was made.
- (p) Who is considered to own the footage taken as part of the film production.
- (q) Has any income been earned from sales of the film, and how many screenings and by whom have there been since the initial telecast; if so what sum has been received, where has it been paid, and what royalty has been paid to the film producer.
- (r) Has the Fox History channel sought to access the film, and on what conditions; if so, what is the current situation with respect to negotiation, cost and use of any such revenue.
- (s) Who is responsible for deciding future use and access to the film and associated material, that is, who has the copyright and who exercises the authority.
- (t) Does the Australian War Memorial have ownership, or does it effectively operate a power of veto over future use with respect to footage used in the film; if not, what are the processes.
- (u) What is the connection between Mullion Creek and the selected company for the production of "Australians at War".
- (v) When did the principals of Mullion Creek approach the Minister with their proposal to produce the "Australians at War Film Archive".
- (w) What specific advice was given to the Minister with respect to the avoidance of public tender processes.
- (x) Which other government agencies and approval mechanisms were involved in the decisions on both film contracts.
- (y) Was approval of those organisations given, and if so, was it in written form.
- (z) What role did the Minister have in the process, and what instructions were given by the Minister with respect both to the concept, and the avoidance of tender processes.
- (Aa) How is the project funded, and whose approval was sought and given.
- (Bb) On what date was approval given, and what was the agreed amount.
- (Cc) How many variations have been made to the contract so far, and what was the cost and purpose of each.
- (Dd) How many veterans from which campaigns will be interviewed.
- (Ee) What is the estimated final cost of the project and when will it be finished.

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- (Ff) Why was there no public tender for this proposal, and what are the specific reasons against each guideline for Commonwealth tendering processes being by passed.
- (Gg) Who will own and have control of the copyright for this series of veteran interviews.
- (Hh) Is there a supervisory panel managing the project, and if so, who are its members. How was each selected and who made the appointment.
- (Ii) To what extent has the AWM been involved, and is it likely they will be the custodians of the final product.
- (Jj) How many other proposals have been put to DVA in the last two years for film production, by whom, which were accepted besides that of Mullion Creek, which were rejected, and for what reason.

> Each shortlisted tenderer attended a meeting with the Documentary Reference Group in Canberra on 25 or 26 August 1999, to give them the opportunity to raise any general matters about the enhanced tender process and to provide feedback on their initial tender response.

Shortlisted tenderers each made a presentation to the Documentary Reference Group on 30 September or 6 October 1999.

Although most contact with tenderers was conducted in writing, DVA staff responded to telephone enquiries concerning appointment times for meetings with the Documentary Reference Group.

(n) No extensions were made to the contract.

16 minor variations were made at no additional cost, covering matters such as:

- minor reallocations of funds within the overall budget;
- variation to the cashflow schedule to align it with payments under the Network Agreement;
- approval of a new signatory for bank accounts;
- changes to production personnel; and
- timing of the final audit and approval of the auditor.
- (o) Beyond Productions submitted regular cost and production progress reports in accordance with the contract. Payment of each drawdown in the cashflow schedule was contingent on satisfactory progress.

Regular progress reports were received from First Australian Completion Bond Company, the completion guarantor, which scrutinised all production and budget reports and provided advice to the investor, DVA.

- (p) The Commonwealth of Australia
- (q) ABC Television rebroadcast the series over eight weeks from 13 March 2005. Subsequently, an agreement was signed by the ABC, Beyond Productions and DVA in which the ABC agreed to release Beyond and DVA from the holdback period for subscription television rights in Australia from 1 April 2005. With DVA's permission, Beyond then entered into an agreement with National Geographic Channel to screen the series in Australia from 24 April 2005. The agreement allows unlimited runs over a three year period.

Income has been earned by DVA from:

- royalties from Screenrights as a result of educational institutions copying the series from the initial telecast (\$511,465); and
- royalties from ABC Enterprises as a result of sales of videos, DVDs and books (\$198,280).

These sums were paid into the DVA Official Australians at War Exempt Trust Account set up under Section 20 of the *Financial Management and Accountability Act*, 1997.

Income from the sale to National Geographic Channel will be in two payments due in July 2005 and July 2006. The licence fee is US\$40,000. DVA will receive 70 per cent of the licence fee and Beyond will receive 30 per cent.

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Beyond Productions has received a total of \$55,113 in Screenrights royalties.

- (r) Beyond Marketing advised DVA that the Fox History Channel inquired in June 2004 about access to the series, proposing to screen it in Australia and New Zealand. At the time of the inquiry Fox was advised by Beyond that the series was only licensed for screening in Australia. In addition to this, it was also pointed out to Fox History Channel that the ABC had, at that time, an exclusive license to broadcast the series until April 2006. Fox did not pursue the matter.
- (s) DVA on behalf of the Commonwealth of Australia.
- (t) The AWM has ownership of footage it supplied for the making of the series. This footage was supplied under the terms of a licence agreement, as was footage obtained from other sources. The AWM and other suppliers of footage can be approached for permission to use the footage beyond the terms of each licence agreement.

- (w) The concept for the Film Archive was developed by Mr Michael Caulfield of Mullion Creek Productions. On 5 October 2001 the then Minister for Veterans' Affairs approved funding for the conduct of a pilot project for the proposed Australians at War Film Archive by Mullion Creek Productions. The pilot established the need for and viability of producing a full film archive.

On 6 November 2002 DVA recommended to the then Minister that it enter into a contract with Mullion Creek Productions to produce the Australians at War Film Archive on the basis that:

- the concept was developed by Mr Caulfield of Mullion Creek Productions;
- Mullion Creek Productions offered value for money;
- Mr Caulfield had delivered the Australians at War documentary series \$220,000 under the \$5.64 million budget and the Film Archive pilot \$40,000 under the \$300,000 budget;
- a tender process would add six to nine months to the project many veterans would pass away before their memories could be recorded;
- · there was no relevant expertise in-house;
- Mr Caulfield had personally established close links with the veteran community during the production of Australians at War and enjoyed their trust and respect, hence he had direct access to a relevant network; and
- Mr Caulfield had pre-eminent expertise to direct the Film Archive project due to his experience as the Series Producer of the Australians at War series.

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On 9 November 2002 the then Minister approved DVA entering into a contract with Mullion Creek Productions for production of the Australians at War Film Archive. On 11 November 2002 she announced Government approval for the Film Archive and noted that the concept had been developed by Mr Caulfield of Mullion Creek Productions who would be commissioned to produce the Film Archive.

- (y) Representatives of the organisations took part as full members of the tender evaluation team and documentary reference group.
- (z) Refer to response to (w). The Minister gave no instructions about the concepts or tender processes.
- (Aa) The Australians at War Film Archive is funded from Commemorations program Administered funds and royalty payments in the Australians at War Exempt Trust Account. The then Minister approved the funding on 9 November 2002.
- (Bb) On 5 October 2001, the then Minister approved funding of up to \$300,000 for the conduct of the pilot project by Mullion Creek Productions.
 On 9 November 2002, the then Minister approved funding for the project.
 The project commenced in 2002/03, with a view to completion in 2004/05 at an estimated cost of up to \$6 million. Final expenditure will be \$5.5 million.

Individual payments under the contract are approved by the Delegate, the Branch Head Commemorations.

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Question 1

Outcome: All Outcomes

Topic: Advertising or public information projects

Written question on notice 18 May 2004

Senator Andrew Murray

Please provide a list of all advertising or public information projects currently being undertaken or expected to be undertaken by the department or agency in the course of 2004 where the cost of the project is estimated or contracted to be \$100 000 or more, indicating:

- (a) the purpose and nature of the project;
- (b) the intended recipients of the information to be communicated by the project;
- (c) who authorised or is to authorise the project;
- (d) the manner in which the project is to be carried out;
- (e) who is to carry out the project;
- (f) whether the project is to be carried out under a contract;
- (g) whether such contract was let by tender;
- (h) the estimated or contracted cost of the project.

Answer:

Both the Department of Veterans' Affairs and the Australian War Memorial have a nil response to this question.
