SENATE COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES

REPORT TO FINANCE AND PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION LEGISLATION COMMITTEE – MAY ESTIMATES 2010

TRENDS DURING THE 41ST AND 42ND PARLIAMENTS

The attached statistics and tables show trends in the activities of Senate committees during the 41st and 42nd parliaments. The Department has met the recent substantial increase in Committee work referred by the Senate by;

- enlarging the budget allocation for Committee work; and
- using a variety of staffing strategies.

These matters are described and the trends can be summarised as follows:

41st Parliament

During the 41st Parliament, there was a;

- · Reduction in numbers of references to committees; and
- No select committees appointed after 1 July 2005.

As a consequence, with committees being less active, staff vacancies arising out of normal turnover were not filled. Committee activities were able to be supported with fewer staff, with staff gradually being reduced during the 40th and 41st Parliaments from 62 FTE staff in 2003, to FTE 53 staff by the end of the 41st Parliament in July 2008.

42nd Parliament

During the 42nd Parliament, there was an:

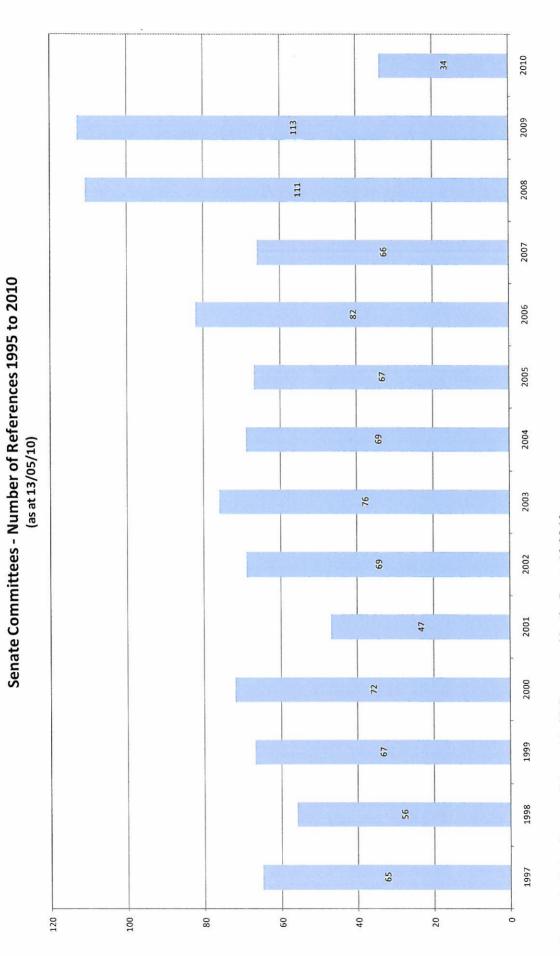
- Increase in the numbers of references to committees, the busiest committees
 with the most number of references have been Economics (maximum of 14
 references at one time), Legal and Constitutional Affairs (maximum of 7
 references at one time) and Community Affairs (maximum of 14 references at
 one time);
- This increase in activity is also reflected in the numbers of committee reports being tabled, with the Legal and Constitutional Affairs Committee tabling 44 reports, the Economics Committee tabling 37 reports and the Community Affairs Committee tabling 23 reports during 2009.

- In the first 5 months of 2010, the Economics Committee tabled 10 reports, the Community Affairs Committee tabled six reports and the Legal and Constitutional Committee also tabled six reports.
- Four select committees have continued to operate during the past 12 months (one of which, Agricultural and Related Industries, has two concurrent references).

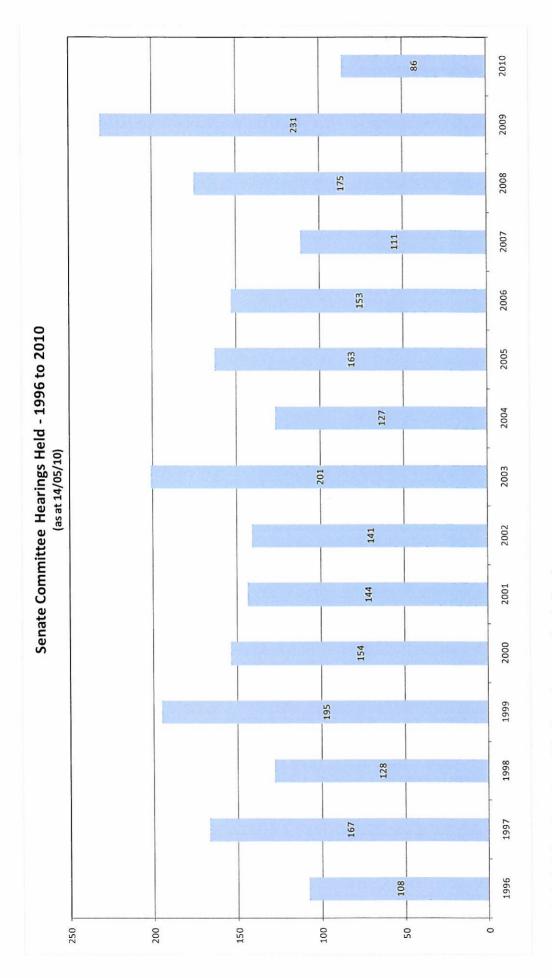
The committee office FTE staffing level as at May 2010 is 59, slightly less than at the peak of activity during 2009 when it was 62, but still close to the levels of staffing and committee activity experienced in 2003–04.

A variety of workload management strategies have been used in the Senate committee office to meet the significant increase in workload since July 2008 as follows:

- Committee secretariats which are less busy frequently provide research, analysis and administrative assistance to committee secretariats with large numbers of references and those with very short reporting deadlines;
- Officers from other areas of the Department have undertaken additional duties to assist committee secretariats;
- Committee staff have been asked to work (in some cases, significant amounts of) additional hours;

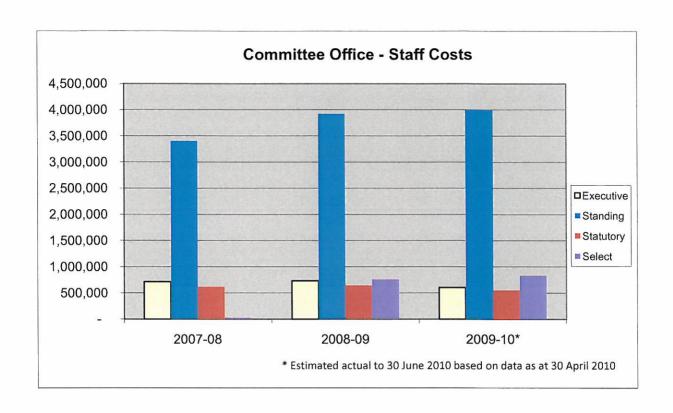

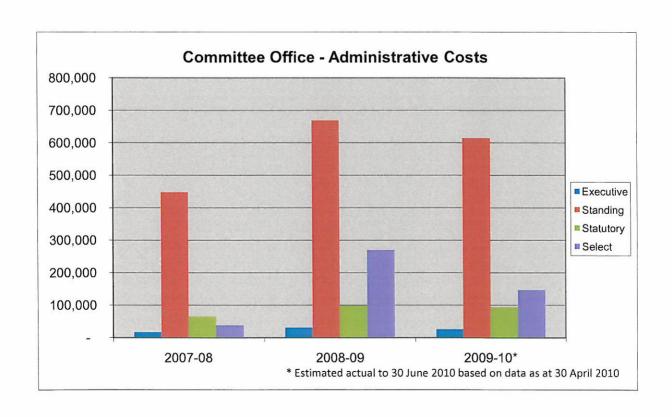
