## **Question:**

- a) Does the Department conduct any auditing programs to ensure that employees travelling under the WOAG are abiding by the 'lowest practical fare' guidelines?
- b) What is the outcome of these audits? Are departments, agencies etc directed to implement changes in response?

## **Answer:**

- a) There has been no auditing program around compliance with the Lowest Practical Fare (LPF) policy, which came into effect as of 1 January 2010. However, the LPF Policy states: "in all situations where official air travel is undertaken, a reason why any fare is selected which is outside the scope of being the lowest practical fare, must be documented. This should be limited to:
  - any internal agency targets for travel on smaller airlines intended to encourage and maintain competition on particular routes;
  - the most direct or shortest route, so as to minimise traveller inconvenience;
  - health and safety issues for officers requiring certain facilities;
  - ability to ensure connections for further flights are met; and
  - impact on personal responsibilities such as family (that is where flights would otherwise be outside of normal business hours)".

Under the Australian Government's devolved financial framework and the *Financial Management and Accountability Act 1997*, monitoring compliance with government policy sits with the individual agency and is the responsibility of each agency's Chief Executive.
