**Question No. 82**

**Senator Brandis asked the following question at the hearing on 12 February 2013:**

In relation to staff:

1. How many serving police officers were seconded to the Australian Crime Commission, and from which jurisdiction, each year from 2007/08 to 2012/13? How many of these secondments were funded by the ACC vs jurisdiction funded?
2. What was the ACC staff headcount by employment capacity [*office location*] every year from 2007/08 to 2012/13? How many of these positions were permanent vs part time?
3. How many non-seconded active ACC staff as of 12/13 had previously worked in Australian Federal/State/Territory or overseas law enforcement agencies? Which agencies?
4. How many former AFP staff are working at the ACC as opposed to former State/Territory police staff?
5. How many of those staff have had operational experience at Task Force level- such as Ethnic Crime Task Forces, such as the NSW Mid Eastern Force or Victorian Gangland murder investigations?
6. In 2007/08, 08/09, 09/10, 10/11, 11/12 and 12/13 how many people who had not previously served in any Federal/State/Territory or overseas law enforcement agencies were appointed to jobs with the Australian Crime Commission?
7. Provide a breakdown of permanent ACC staff [*excluding seconded*] based on their professional disciplines – ACC Examiners, Australian Public Servants and contractors and consultants for each year from 2007/08 to 2012/13
8. How many staff made up the Serious Crime Research Team every year from 2007/08 to 2012/13 and how many have backgrounds working in Australian or overseas law enforcement agencies?
9. As of 12/13 how many members of the ACC Serious Crime Research Team are serving members or have a background in Australian or overseas law enforcement agencies?
10. How many members of task forces were working at the ACC each year from 2007/08 to 2012/13?
11. How many ACC staff were dedicated to field work operations every year from 2007/08 to 12/13?

4. There are currently 25 ACC staff who have prior service records that indicate previous employment at the Australian Federal Police as opposed to 75 with state police services.
5. The ACC possesses a range of staff with previous law enforcement experience with operational experience at Task Force level. This includes individuals who have led state and territory police task forces. However, whilst the ACC has a good understanding of the skills and capabilities of each individual officer, the ACC does not maintain information on previous work experience to this level of detail.

The genesis of the Serious Crime Research Team (SCRT) was the National Indigenous Intelligence Task Force's (NIITF) research capability. The NIITF's research capability successfully supported ACC intelligence and operational activity and insights by further developing an evidence-base on issues affecting child sexual abuse and violence against women in Indigenous communities. The research produced from the NIITF was used to inform strategic decision making by law enforcement and Government.

The SCRT was formally established in late 2010 in recognition of the need to further develop insights derived from ACC intelligence and operational activity. The SCRT staffing complement is set at three officers. However, the SCRT has been at times made up of seconded staff from the Australian Institute of Criminology (criminologists) and the Australian Bureau of Statistics (statistician). Officers working for the SCRT have had a range of experience working within the law enforcement environment, including the Queensland Criminal Justice Commission, the National Crime Authority, Defence and the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade.

9. The SCRT is currently staffed by one full time EL1 and two part-time officers (1 x EL2 and 1x EL1).

Currently, two SCRT officers have extensive experience working within the law enforcement environment across various ACC teams since 2004. Of these two officers, one has also worked with the Queensland Criminal Justice Commission (now the Queensland Crime and Misconduct Commission) and the National Crime Authority. The other came from Defence. The third current team member has had extensive international liaison experience whilst working for the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade.
